## Minutes of Monthly Meeting December 2010

### **Minutes of the SCCC General Meeting Held at the Caloundra Community Youth Hall 4 December 2010**

#### **Meeting: Commenced 11.00 am**

**Minutes of the Previous Meeting** No business arising from the previous months minutes.

**Motion proposed by Ray White that the previous months minutes be accepted was Seconded by Beth Caithness. CARRIED**

**New Members:** Patricia Abell, Marjorie Allison, Lorraine Goeldner, Trevor Kassulke, Keith Lumb, Ian and Renee Stringer.

**Treasurers Report:** Before the Treasurer gave his report, President Peter Daley announced that we had had number of inquiries about the state of the club's bank account and why the figures are not published in the monthly magazine.

Peter said the main reason for this, is that there is an auditors report every year in February, which is published in the March edition of the Bits'N'Bytes.

Our magazines are available in public places such as libraries and it has been the experience of other organisations that once these figures are published, the organisations will be inundated with begging emails and requests for donations.

At the beginning of the year members were informed that the club had excess funds, and a survey was held as to how members would like the funds to be spent. We had good feed back and many suggestions have been put in place at Buderim, Caloundra and Yandina. He went on to say that we had a number of working accounts that would be explained fully by our Treasurer Leo Kavanagh.

Leo has taken over from Heather Atkinson, who has been our treasurer for many years. Peter thanked Heather for the great job she had done in looking after the clubs finances for so many years.

Leo then told the members present that we have \$1,361.35 in the Heritage cheque account, this being the account we use to pay all our invoices . In the Rabo Plus Savings account there is \$5,102.28, this can be drawn upon at any time and is in place in case of emergencies or unforeseen expenses.

We also have \$15,000.00 in a Heritage term deposit, which is due in February, and if that money is not needed it will be rolled over. The total amount of money the club has today is \$21,464.23. Leo said these figures were always available to members at any time on a request to him.

It is a committee decision not to publish the figures generally, but as Peter has said a full auditors report is published in the March Bits'N'Bytes. The Treasurers report is closed off on the 20<sup>th</sup> of each month to allow time to get the report published in the Bits'N'Bytes.

Revenue from meetings and membership fees are our main source of income, while hall hire and refreshments and printing and postage of Bits'N'Bytes our biggest expenditure. Leo explained the make up of the Administration Fee, in answer to a members question, that is \$400 to The Administrator Jean Lear, \$100 each to the Treasurer Leo Kavanagh and Editor of the magazine, Judy Smith, this is basically to cover the costs they incur personally in carrying out these positions.

The club is presently in a good financial position.

**Leo Kavanagh proposed that the Treasurer's Report be accepted. This was seconded by Ruby Kearsley CARRIED**

**General Business:** Peter Daley explained that all the club's equipment, computers, printers, and data projectors etc: are renewed every two years, and the \$15,000 we have in reserve is for this purpose. Peter said that this disclosure of funds is being recorded to put to rest any questions members may have about the financial state of the club.

There being no further business Peter called the meeting to a close at 11.15am.

## Tech Tips – Bill Maxwell

### USING MICROSOFT OFFICE ONLINE

You don't have Microsoft Office 2010 installed on your computer and you don't want to spend the money. Now you can access Office ONLINE for Free.

As part of the release of Microsoft Office 2010, in addition to the boxed version, Microsoft also released cut-down versions of Word, Excel, PowerPoint and One Note, which can be run from any web browser and is FREE to use.

To get started with this application in the Cloud, Office Web Apps, visit <http://login.live.com> and sign in using your Windows Live ID. Your Hotmail ID will also work. If you don't have a Windows Live ID you can create one for free.

When your signed in, click the Office link on the top line to view your Office Online tools. On the right of the page under the heading "Create a new online document" are the links for creating new documents in Word, Excel, PowerPoint or OneNote.

For Example, Click the Word icon, type a name for your document and click SAVE. Online Word will open. The title will be "Microsoft Word Web App, your document name, on SkyDrive.

Create and save your document just as you would with the installed version of Word. You can even print your document. When you save the Document it will NOT be saved on your computer, it is saved on SkyDrive in the Cloud.

Once you have saved a document it will be listed under the heading "Recent Documents on SkyDrive". To open a Document just single click on the documents name.

When you are finished with word click on the X in the upper right hand corner and you will be returned to the All Documents page. Click on Office to return to the main office page.

If you want to save the document on your computer, Point to the Document name and a "MORE" link will open to the right of the documents name, click on More and a menu will open with these options: Version History, Rename, Download and Properties. Click Download, and then depending on which browser you are using, select a folder to save in and select SAVE. The document may wind up in your Downloads folder or your Documents folder depending on how you

set your browser. After you save a document you may have to click the BACK button on your browser to return to the main page.

The advantage of this is that you can share documents with your friends and you can access them from any computer when you are travelling. To share you would have to give your friends your user name and password, so you may want to create a special account just for sharing. It also makes a handy tool for working collaboratively online with others.

Microsoft Word, Power Point and Excel each include a new feature for capturing images off your computer screen. These can be used when creating training materials and for adding help information to documents and worksheets.

Go to Insert >>> Screenshot and you'll see a panel showing thumbnails representing each of the programs you have open. To use one of these, click on it and it will be inserted into the document. You can size the image to suit by dragging on its handles.

When you are completely finished click on Sign Out in the upper right corner.

**Note:** you need to be connected to the internet during the entire period you are using Microsoft Office Online.

### The Name "Apple Computer"

A lot of people wonder where the name "Apple Computer" came from, as it is a rather unusual name for a computer company. Steve Jobs came up with the name in early 1976. At the time, he was often visiting and working on a small farm friends of his owned. It was a hippie commune where Steve spent a few months of the year. When he returned from one of those stays, he told Steve Wozniak about his idea. Jobs probably was working on apple plantages. Or he just wanted their start-up to be in front of Atari in the phone book. Or it was a tribute to Apple Records, the music label of the Beatles. Whatever the true origin of the name was, Woz knew instantly that they were going to be in trouble with Apple Records sooner or later. But as they were unable find a name that sounded better than Apple Computer, the name was chosen.

Woz's worries turned out to be justified. Apple Computer, Inc. was sued by Apple Records over trademark violations in 1989.

### Print Screen Key and Its Use

The Print Screen Key may appear differently depending on the manufacturer of the keyboard. (Prt Sc / Print Screen) The standard position is at the upper right hand corner of the keyboard. When pressed, the key sends the current screen image to the computer clipboard.(the invisible holding area for content that is copied). Open a programme (Word pad, MS Word document, Open Office Writer, E mail, graphics programme etc) and place the cursor where the copy is to appear. Use the keyboard, Ctrl + V (or Edit > Paste) to paste the screenshot into your open document. If required, do another Print Screen and paste that also into the document. This action can be completed as many times as necessary to record all actions taken. Generally only one Print Screen can be held on the Clip Board at the one time. It is possible to print from the document if not required for future use. Save (Ctrl + S) (or File > Save) the document if required for future reference. It is possible to copy the print screen document to a flash drive to bring it to a Club Meeting to help explain some action that is taking place on your computer at home, and seek help or an explanation with a problem. Clicking the Alt Key and the Print Screen Key together will copy only the current active window from the screen. As previously, paste copy to a

document. Computers without an additional programme installed will only keep the last copied item on the clipboard. Paste the copy to clear the clipboard before doing the next Print Screen or copy. There are programmes available (generally at a cost) that will print directly to a printer after using the print screen key.

### Windows 7 and Vista Users - Snipping Tool

If you use Windows 7 or Vista there is another way to grab screenshots by using the Snipping Tool. The Snipping Tool can capture the whole Windows Desktop or specific windows. It can also capture particular areas of the display. To launch the Snipping Tool click the start button, point to all Programmes followed by Accessories and then click Snipping Tool. Click the down-pointing arrow next to the new button to see the snip types. There is Free-form, Rectangular, Window (the equivalent of the Alt and Print Screen) and the Full Screen (the equivalent to pressing the Print Screen) If you select the Rectangular Snip the screen will fade. Now click and hold down the left mouse button and drag in any direction to select a rectangular area which will be highlighted by a red border. Release the mouse button to make the capture. The selected area will be displayed in the Snipping Tool window, where various options are available. Click the 'Save Snip' icon (next to the New icon) and follow the prompts to save as an HTML, JPEG, GIF, or PNG image file. Alternately copy the screen shot to the Windows Clipboard by clicking the Copy button (or pick Copy from the Edit menu) The last two buttons on the Snipping Tool's toolbar are a pen, a highlighter and an eraser.

If you have occasion to use the Snipping Tool frequently it may be pinned to the Start Menu and be readily available.

There are also programmes available, some free and some not free, which can be downloaded and do a similar task as the snipping tool.

## Linux For All – Tony Tasker

### LINUX - TRY IT FOR FREE -

- KEEP IT AT NO EXTRA COST
- HAVE MORE FUN IN 2011 !

At each of our Technology Education Centres (Caloundra, Buderim, Yandina) we have groups of Linux enthusiasts who enjoy their computing (with Linux installed alongside Windows, or instead of Windows) and are more than willing to help anyone wanting to make the switch.

These days when you start on computing you usually have a PC or laptop with Microsoft Windows running it. Why is it then that so many make the switch to Linux? There are many reasons, persuasive to some, not so much to others - but it is only sensible for everyone to give it some thought.

Now, it seems to many users that the cost of Windows is \$0, but it is not. The cost at the time of purchasing a computer is hidden, but the real cost is revealed when you come to buy non-pirated versions of Family Tree Maker, Photoshop, Publisher, and so on. This list depends on your particular needs, but the real, real cost becomes apparent about 12 months later when you are feeling so "last-year" that you fork out for the latest versions of your favourites, plus the next version of Windows. Just to make yourself "feel better".

ALSO - how many laptops or PCs have been pensioned off because buying a new one is the easiest way to get the latest Windows! One of the advantages of club membership is that you can purchase Windows 8 (say) and get help to install it. By the same token, we can help you install Linux, and there is less at stake because the cost really is \$0. It is \$0 per laptop, \$0 per PC, \$0 per person - it is \$0 per anything. This FREEDOM to TRY OUT a new distribution or a new program is perhaps the greatest attraction of free software.

The LINUX ASSISTANCE GROUPS at the different venues will help you CHOOSE a suitable distro (and install it) and make sure you have all the programs you need installed as well. We assist with maintenance - questions that arise - installing further programs - in fact everything you need for a great user experience. If you are not sure who to talk to, ask at the front table at any venue. At Caloundra there is a well-organised group. At other venues it is more a matter of finding an individual who can understand your needs and give a hand.

OK - there must be other reasons for a switch?

Of course. The greatest of these reasons is - SECURITY.

Linux is SECURE.

An Apple Mac is ALSO pretty secure.

A Windows machine is NOT.

At the Club, various speakers spend a great proportion of their time talking about the need to keep yourself secure in an up-to-date manner. This is ESSENTIAL if you run Windows, but it is COMPLETELY UNNECESSARY if you use Linux. I explained in a recent talk why it is that hackers (of the evil kind) do not create viruses for Linux, and it is not because Windows-users form a majority. I also explained that even if hackers did create a virus, you would not get it, and even if you did get one, it could not install itself. Let me repeat -

LINUX is COMPLETELY SECURE.

I came to Linux after a virus disaster with Windows. For about 12 years I have been surfing the web constantly. I have been downloading and installing as many programs as I feel like (from the correct repositories, of course) and for about 11 of these years without any anti-virus software.

Because VIRUSES CAN'T GET ME.

Well then - Why isn't Linux as widespread as Windows?

THE ANSWER --- IT IS.

Home users like ourselves don't see it, but Linux is everywhere. I'll give some examples.

**SMARTPHONES:** Windows Mobile has a very small market share. Apple and Linux carry the weight here - and Apple is based on Unix, just as is Linux.

**SMALL DEVICES:** Even the automobile computers need to run on something. Linux is a not-uncommon choice for all sorts of devices.

**NETBOOKS:** Linux can be tailored to fit on the smallest netbook. The zero-cost to the hardware manufacturer is significant when the retail price is low; incidentally, this is a shame, because many people get a poor idea of Linux from cheap-and-nasty machines where the hardware is the actual problem. Linux is cheap, at \$0, but it is certainly not nasty!

**OTHER PORTABLE COMPUTERS:** Many hardware manufacturers have signed contracts which virtually force them to load Windows by default.

## Why You're Going to Love 'The Cloud' or else – James Haxton

When we first realized that The Cloud was the future, we were sceptical: all that information on the web - hanging out there like fruit on a tree - just waiting for hackers and criminals of all types to come pick it. We were wrong. Web security is getting better and better - and data that is stored on the web is backed up several different ways, in several different locations. We're not saying we don't have any concerns about the safety and security of personal information and data stored on web servers - we certainly do. But the companies who provide "cloud applications" have done a superlative job in keeping the data we store on their servers safe and secure. And they're getting better at that every day as new ways to secure online data are discovered.

Whether we or any of you agree with the rapidly moving migration of applications and data from the desktop to The Cloud or not, it's happening and there's nothing that's going to stop it.

The weakest link to security of data stored on the web is your password. We've covered that subject dozens of times in these newsletters. Either you've heeded our advice and have changed all your passwords to 12 or more characters - or you haven't. And by now you should have installed a good password manager like Roboform or LastPass - if you haven't then all we can say after reminding you several dozen times is: You Should!

Whether you've taken seriously our warnings to change all your passwords to twelve-character passwords and to never use the same password on different sites, or not, The Cloud is here to stay and it's only going to get "cloudier" as the months and years pass.

Five years ago, most of us accessed the Web from home, school, or work using a desktop computer. Some of us had laptops, but the desktop was still our main doorway to the internet. Take a look around you now. People are accessing the web so many different ways - cell phones, iPads (and clones), laptops, netbooks, and yes, desktops. People are no longer limited to or satisfied with being tethered to their desktop in order to access the web. And as more and more of us use mobile devices to access the web, the more and more useful and necessary The Cloud is going to become.

Soon, laptops will be coming from the world's largest computer manufacturers that will not be Windows-based. They'll be Google Chrome-based. These new generation laptops will be faster, lighter, sleeker, and more mobile than any before. They will take less than

five seconds to boot up and shutdown. They won't have terabyte hard drives or 4GB of RAM. They won't have hard drives as we know them at all. They'll use SD cards for storage. The applications you run using these laptops are in "The Cloud". You don't need a huge amount of built-in storage space to store applications, photos, documents, etc. It's all stored in "The Cloud". Your computer is faster because it's not loaded down with huge programs and your hard drive is not full of data. You no longer have to install huge Windows programs, you download small, fast, "apps". Those of you who use smart phones or iPads know all about "apps". Apps are to smart phones and these new Chrome laptops what programs are to Windows. But apps don't require huge amounts of hard drive space or memory to run. Many of them run from The Cloud and the ones that don't are small footprint, memory efficient applications.

The advantages of The Cloud far outweigh the disadvantages. You can access your data and your programs from anywhere using multiple devices - your netbook, your laptop, your cell phone, your touchpad computer, or even your old desktop. You can even access your data from someone else's computer or a public computer at an internet cafe or library. Add to this that all the data you store in The Cloud is backed up not only once but several times in several locations, you risk of losing important data is much less that it would be if you stored it locally on your own hard drive or external hard drive.

We've been saying for a couple years now that the days of Windows as we know it, are over. There may well be a Windows 8 or even a Windows 9, but Apple and Google are blazing a trail to a brave new world. It may well be too late for Microsoft to overcome Apple and Google. For years, Microsoft has been getting fat, releasing new versions of Windows that were really nothing more than old versions of Windows with some improvements and a fresher appearance. But some of the basics of Windows haven't changed since Windows 95 - at its core, Windows is still Windows and that may not bode well for Microsoft as the computer users everywhere discover the advantages of The Cloud.

Whether you think, or we think, The Cloud is a good idea, it's here to stay. In the coming year we're going to see more and more devices coming to market that let us access the web and hence The Cloud in more and more ways.

I just got done watching a new device that turns your smart phone into a full-fledged laptop - keyboard, LCD screen and all.

It's not without some reservations that we sit on the precipice of a radical new era of computing. We've based our newsletters and our software, even our entire company on Windows. It's rather sad that Microsoft has become the GM of the computer world. They've gotten used to being at the top and they've scoffed at competitors like Apple and Google; Microsoft long ago stopped being an innovator.

In 2010 we saw more changes in the way users access the internet than in any time period before. There are far too many advantages to basing applications and storage in The Cloud for it not to be so.
