The Media Player You Use Can Make a Big Difference - Peter Daley

Foobar2000, and **Asio4All** are designed specifically to improve the playback quality of the sound from Windows computers, and as a bonus they're free!

Foobar2000 is a free, efficient and friendly media player without the program bloat. Some of the media players that most of you are using are over seventy megs and growing just to download. Once installed these modern media players are multiple times bigger than my original computer hard drive on which I did everything! They're very resource hungry, and not very intuitive to use.

Foobar2000 is light weight 2.8 meg download, and once installed it opens instantly, places very little load on your computer resources and does the job it is designed to do better, and more efficiently than other overweight players, plus as a bonus you also get better playback sound quality. It supports these formats natively, MP1, MP2, MP3, MP4, MPC, AAC, Ogg Vorbis, FLAC / Ogg FLAC, WavPack, WAV, AIFF, AU, SND, CDDA, WMA. Because it is light weight it works great on older computers.

It has an inbuilt equalizer and tabbed play list browsing. I find it very intuitive to use. You can stream your music through it off the Internet. There are also third party programs that work with it to do specialized tasks.

Asio4all allows you to bypass the primitive Windows sound processing, and get better sound quality playback. Asio4all can be started in two ways from a desktop icon, or from a plug in you can add to your media player. Foobar2000 has a Aiso4all plug in available. Aiso4all can be activated from the desktop icon before you start your media player if your the player does not have a Asio4all plug in.

If you use Foobar2000 and Aiso4All in conjunction with the advice I gave in one of my previous blogs you can get even better sound quality playback.

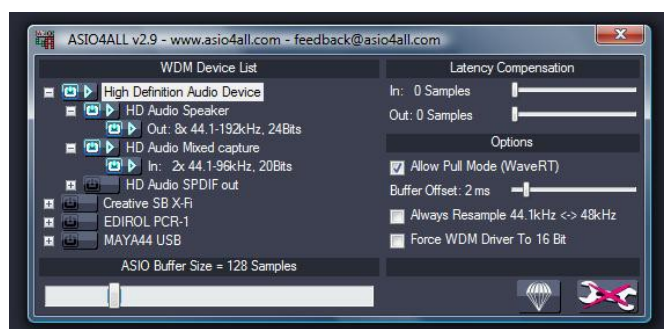
The better quality the computer, headphones, speakers or the HiFi system you use to playback the sound from your computer the more you will notice the sound quality improvement.

Microsoft Abandons Windows 8.1 Take Immediate Action Or Be Cut Off Like Windows XP – Peter Dodwell

"Windows 8.1 Update is a cumulative update to Windows 8.1," said Microsoft Senior Product Marketing Manager Ben Hunter in an apparently innocuous blog post aimed at IT professionals. Then came the clanger: "It also becomes the new servicing baseline for Windows 8.1, so next month's security updates (on 13 May 14, the next 'Patch Tuesday') will be dependent on Windows 8.1 Update."

In English: If you have not installed Update 1 by 13 May 14 then Windows 8.1 will no longer receive security updates until you do. This is your four week countdown warning.

"So after 13th May Microsoft will issue security patches that detail flaws they are fixing and those flaws will be left unpatched for all Windows 8.1 users until they apply Update 1. A nightmare scenario. Users who stay with Windows 8.1 will face the same scenario Windows XP users are in after Microsoft cut off security updates this month."



Watch out for iBanking Android Rogue on Facebook

Malware has gone mobile, and now it's getting social too.

A new one-two punch combination uses a malicious Javascript web injection on Facebook to try to fool

users into downloading the iBanking rogue app onto their Android device.

The prompt to download a "unique software tool" uses social engineering to try to trick Facebook users into downloading a supposed security app that enables two-factor authentication for their Facebook account. In reality, this "security app" is iBanking, an Android malware that can:

- Intercept real two factor authentication codes sent by real service providers
- Capture any incoming/outgoing SMS text
- Redirect outgoing calls to a pre-programmed phone number
- Capture audio by activating microphone
- Steal metadata – call log and contacts list

How to Avoid Infection

First thing's first: If you log onto Facebook on your computer and are mysteriously prompted to download a "unique software tool for safe and secure authentication" onto your Android device, do not proceed.

If this occurs, your computer has already been infected and downloading the software will infect your Android device as well. In the event that you are seeing such a prompt, we'd encourage you to seek help at Emsisoft's [Help My PC is Infected!](http://support.emsisoft.com/forum/6-help-my-pc-is-infected/)

Malware removal is free, even if you are not an Emsisoft customer.

Font of All Knowledge

From Brisbane Sunday Mail 6 April 2014

A Pittsburgh teenager, whose school had been on a paper saving drive, noticed that different fonts used different amounts of ink. Using a software program, he looked at five documents produced by five US government agencies and estimated how much ink would be used with three typefaces - Garamond, Times New Roman and Century Gothic. He found using 12-point Garamond would save about 29 per cent in ink costs.

Add Background Colour etc to Random Cells in an Apache Open Office Calc (Spreadsheet)

Open a Calc document and firstly check if the 'format paintbrush' icon is on the standard toolbar. If the icon is not there -

Click on the down arrow on the bar at the end of the standard toolbar and from the Drop down > click Visible Buttons > find the icon for 'format paintbrush' and click on it to make it active on the toolbar.

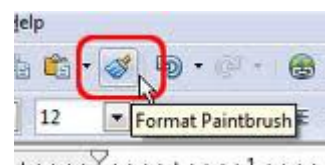
On the Calc document > Select a Cell to format the background colour > Format > Cells > and from (Format Cells Window) > Background > select colour > Click OK. (This fills chosen cell with colour)

With the (coloured) Cell selected > double click the 'format paintbrush' icon on the toolbar. The cursor will change to a paint pot pouring paint. Select any cell on the spreadsheet > left click to add the colour Repeat on other cells to fill with this colour > Press the Escape key on the Keyboard to finish adding colour (or double click the format paintbrush icon on the tool bar)

This action may be repeated to choose another colour to add to various other cells in the Calc document. Press the Escape key or double click the format paintbrush icon to return to working on the spreadsheet.

The colour may be added to a cell before or after text has been written in the cell.

Any of the formatting options in the Format Cell Window can also be applied to the original cell formatting such as Borders, Font, Font Effects, Alignment etc and will be carried over to other cells when the format paintbrush is used.



Copying and Pasting Text, Files or Folders – Jean Lear**Copying and Pasting Text, Files or Folders**

This is divided into two parts – Copy and Paste

Copy

Text can be selected using the mouse in various ways which makes the text become highlighted (this is an example of **highlightedtext**).

Why Highlight text?

- the highlighted text can be copied and pasted to another part of the document or between one application and another or copy and move files and directories from one location to another.
- Changes can be made to text that is highlighted and changes made will apply to all that highlighted text. (EG – change text to Bold, Italic, Underlined or from lower case to upper case etc)

Any amount of text may be selected from a character, a word, a line, a paragraph, a page or even a whole document. To select any amount of text, drag the cursor I-beam across the required text. Dragging means to hold down the left mouse button whilst moving the I-bar across text.

One of the handiest functions on computers is learning the shortcuts to copy and paste text quickly and easily. Keyboard shortcuts make the going easier, rather than taking the longer method of menu navigation (Edit and from the Drop Down menu > Copy) or right clicking after highlighting text and clicking on Copy in the menu that comes up. The shortcuts in Windows-style keyboards use the Control (Ctrl) key in combination with the 'C' key to copy.

To begin, place the cursor (I beam) at the beginning of the text you wish to copy, then hold down the left mouse button and drag the cursor across the text to highlight it. You can drag it downwards to cover multiple sentences or paragraphs if need be. Let up on the mouse button when you've reached the end of the text you want to copy.

If it is necessary to highlight more text than is visible on a single page, place the cursor at the beginning of the desired text, click once and let go, then scroll down to the end of the desired text, hold down the Shift key and click the mouse at the end point. All text between the two clicked points will highlight automatically.

Alternatives in highlighting are:

- A word: Double-click the word.

- A sentence of text: Treble-click a word in the sentence.
- Multiple lines of text Move the pointer to the left of the lines and then drag up or down. (Remember to keep the left mouse button down until you are at the end of the text to be highlighted.
- A block of text: Place the cursor at the beginning and then click at the end of the block while holding down the Shift key.
- Multiple blocks of text: Click and drag, hold down the Ctrl key while selecting extra blocks.
- Place the I beam at the beginning or the end of a word and hold the shift key down on the keyboard move to the left or right of the insertion point by moving the left and right arrows on the keyboard or the up and down arrows to move up and down.
- Complete document: CTRL+A or Edit > Select All.

To de-select any highlighted text click anywhere on the screen outside the selected area.

Now the required text is highlighted, copy by -

- Holding down the Ctrl key and at the same time click the C key or
- Right-clicking on the screen and from the menu drop down click on Copy or
- From menu at top of page > Edit > Copy

Windows has a feature called the Windows Clipboard. The clipboard gives Windows users the ability to store information in memory and then retrieve that information for later use. The copy and paste functions rely on the clipboard in order to work.

- The process of placing data into the clipboard is known as copying.
- The process of retrieving the data from that clipboard and placing it into another location is called pasting.

It is important to understand that the clipboard is used to contain the data that you want to paste into another location. If there is no information contained in the clipboard, then you will not be able to paste anything.

Copying and Pasting Text, Files or Folders by Jean Lear

Any data that is stored in the clipboard via a copy command will stay there until it is overwritten by another copy command. When data from the clipboard is pasted, the data is not removed from the clipboard, and can be pasted over and over as many times as wish. The data in the clipboard will be erased, though, when you copy something else to the clipboard or shut down or restart your computer.

Paste

Paste means to place information from the Clipboard into another document, or the same document, by retrieving that information from the clipboard.

Simply move your cursor to the location where you would like the data to be pasted into your document and then choose one of the methods for pasting the data.

- Hold down the Control key and the V key at the same time
- Right-clicking on the document and from the menu drop down click on Paste.
- From the Edit menu > click on Paste.

After you use one of the above commands the data contained in the clip board will now be pasted into the document. This action can be repeated as many times as required until another word, block of text, or file is copied to the Clipboard.

It is also possible to use the same key combinations and commands on files and folder. Simply select a file(s) or folder(s) and copy it. Then you can select another location to paste it to.

Knowing how to copy and paste text and files from one location to another is a powerful tool, to move information around in your document or to take information from another document and paste it into another document. This includes the ability copy files and folders from one location and place them into another location.

Using the short cut keys of Ctrl plus C to copy and Ctrl plus V to paste adds to this valuable function on the computer.

Change Text From Lower To Upper Case and More

(MS Word And Open Office Writer And Calc)

The shift key and the **3260** Caps Lock keys on the keyboard allow the changing of case of text as a document is being typed.

On an already typed piece of text there are other options.

MS Word – In an MS Word document a quick way to change text from lower case to capitals or first letter capital is to use the combination SHIFT and F3. With a word or words or a block of text on a page highlighted, each time you hit the SHIFT followed by the F3 key, the text formation will cycle through Lowercase, Capitals and then First Letter Capital. There is also a way to make changes under Format > Change Case which opens a Change Case Window with options there with radio buttons for – Sentence case, lowercase, UPPERCASE, Title Case, and toggle case.

Open Office – Open Office has a capability through Format > Change Case. Here the options are – Sentence Case, lower case, UPPER CASE, Capitalize every word, toggle case. If Open Office is 'Enabled for Asian Languages' there will be additional options available.

Icons for changes to Uppercase and Lowercase can be added to visible buttons on the Formatting tool bar to be used on highlighted text. This can be used both in Open Office Writer and Calc documents.

There are signs in areas with free WiFi - they have blue and yellow writing on a sky background and say 'Free WiFi Sunshine Coast' (see image). It is easy to log in - just follow the on-screen instructions. You will be directed to the terms and conditions and privacy statement.
