Save On Printing Costs - By Peter Daley

One estimate I read was that propriety Inkjet ink works out to cost around \$10,000 US per gallon. Its liquid gold, no wonder they sell the printers cheap!

What are the pros and cons of using refill inks kits, or cartridges that are not made by the manufacturer?

By refilling the Ink jet ink cartridge, you save on having to purchase expensive cartridges, but they can also cost you a lot if you don't follow proper installation guidelines, and something goes wrong. There are local businesses that will refill the empty cartridges for you, if you are not particularly technically minded.

You can generally refill a used cartridge multiple times with a refill kit. This relies on the fact that the mechanics of the cartridge will continue to work after it is emptied. For instance, say a new cartridge costs \$60, and a refill ink kit cost \$40 and you are able to refill a used cartridge four times. You would save \$200, $\$60 \times 4 = \240 minus \$40. That is a very considerable saving.

I have not noticed any difference in the quality of colour or black and white printing with the brand of refill ink I used. Some people have reported to me that they felt the print quality from their brand of refill ink was not as good.

If you use refill ink with a new printer, you void your manufacturer's warranty. So even if it's not the refill ink's fault that your printer stops working, most manufacturers will not fix it under warranty. Better to wait until your warranty ends before using refill inks, perhaps. There is some really good quality refill inks around, which may cost a bit more, but will give you less problems, and a better quality printing, than some of the really cheap Chinese brands.

The biggest cause of problems with using refill kits is people over fill the old cartridge, it leaks and runs onto the circuitry. It is very important to follow the manufacturer's instructions. Also some people have reported problems with some brands of refill inks damaging print heads. On printers that have fixed print heads a damaged print head may be very expensive to replace and maybe not worth the cost of repair. There are no independent studies to verify if refill ink can cause this problem, or if it is simply just print head failure!

Some cheaper printers have removable ink cartridges which have the print head built in. If one of these gets damaged you simply buy a new cartridge.

Check on the internet to see if your ink jet cartridge

brand has a reset button. If they do, by resetting it you can potentially get a lot more printing done. This is because they may have a lot of unused ink in them, even though they were flagged as empty. Do your research before trying this.

The bottom line is you use refill ink at your own risk.

Home photo colour printing is expensive. Even if you don't print in colour every time, when you turn on the printer it squirts out some ink to clear the print head from each of the different colour cartridges! It works out much cheaper to copy your photos onto a CD and get them printed at a commercial photo printer service. They also last longer, and look better.

The alternative cheaper option:

If you don't do very much colour printing, a black and white laser printer is much cheaper to run than any colour inkjet. If you don't need super high quality printing, use the ECO or cartridge setting, and you will be able to print twice as many pages from the toner cartridge. Stay away from some of the newer very cheap laser printers that have a very small toner cartridge. They are using the ink jet business model to rip you off, a small amount of toner for a large cost!

A trick with laser toner cartridges is, if it notifies you that the cartridge is empty and needs replacement, take it out and give it a gentle shake from side to side, and put it back. You will find that you can then print quite a few more pages before it actually does run out completely.



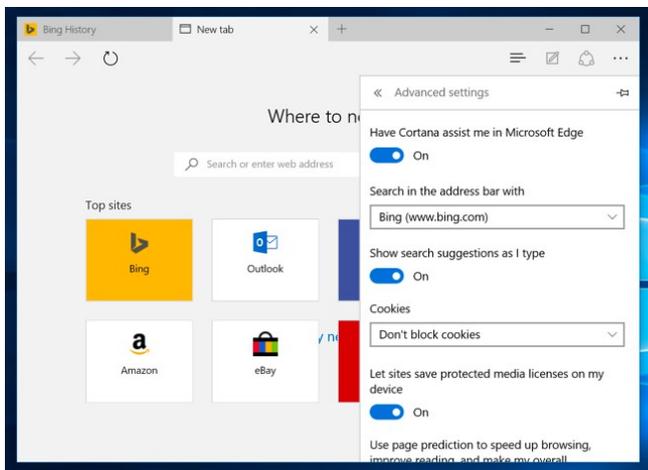

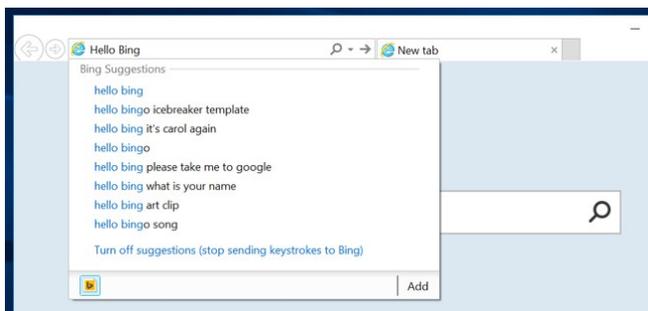

Internet Explorer

Internet Explorer is still around, although it's not the default browser.

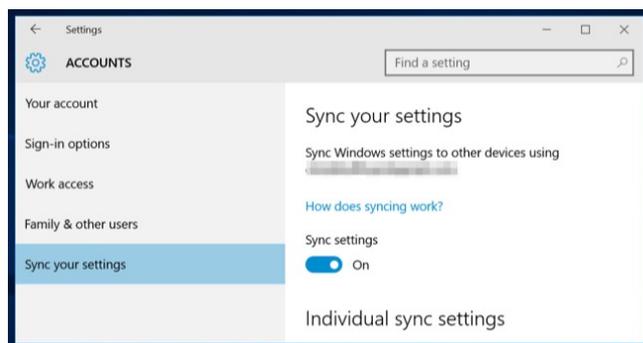
- **SmartScreen** – Internet Explorer also uses SmartScreen, and this can be controlled by clicking the gear menu, pointing to Safety, and selecting Turn off SmartScreen filter.
- **Enable Suggested Sites** – This is an older feature and isn't enabled by default, but is still offered under the Advanced list of settings in the Internet Options window. This little-known feature of Internet Explorer has been around for a long time, and [it uploads your browsing history to Microsoft if you enable it.](#)
- **Bing Suggestions** – As in Edge, anything you type in the address bar is sent to Microsoft's Bing search engine to provide you with search suggestions unless you change search engines or click "Turn off suggestions (stop sending keystrokes to Bing)" after typing in the address bar.



Microsoft Account and Sync

Windows 10 recommends you [sign in with a Microsoft account, just like Windows 8](#). This allows you to log in with the same account you use for other Microsoft services like Outlook.com, Office 365, OneDrive, Skype, MSN, and other services. This also enables a lot of online features in Windows 10, like access to the Windows Store and many included apps that require a Microsoft account, OneDrive file access in File Explorer, and various sync features. You can choose to use a local user account if you prefer.

- **Sync settings** – A variety of Windows settings such as your saved passwords and web browser data are synced by default if you sign in with a Microsoft account. These options are available under Settings > Accounts > Sync your settings.
- **Devices you've logged in from** –Microsoft will keep track devices you've logged in with your Microsoft account. You can view this list at <https://account.microsoft.com/devices>.



Personal history and interests

As Microsoft puts it: "When you're signed into your Microsoft account, Microsoft services like Bing, MSN, and Cortana personalise your experience.

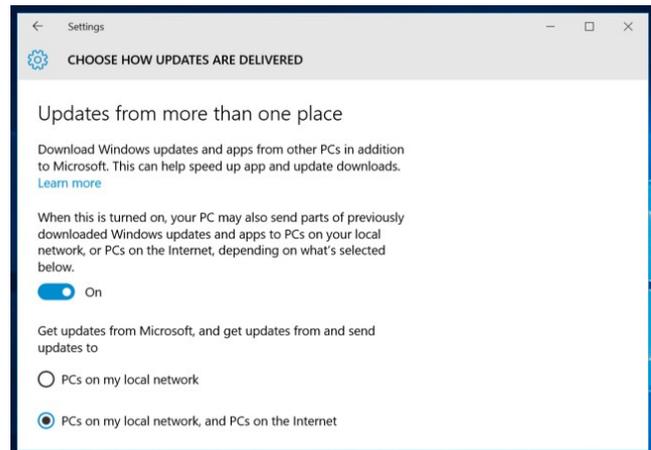
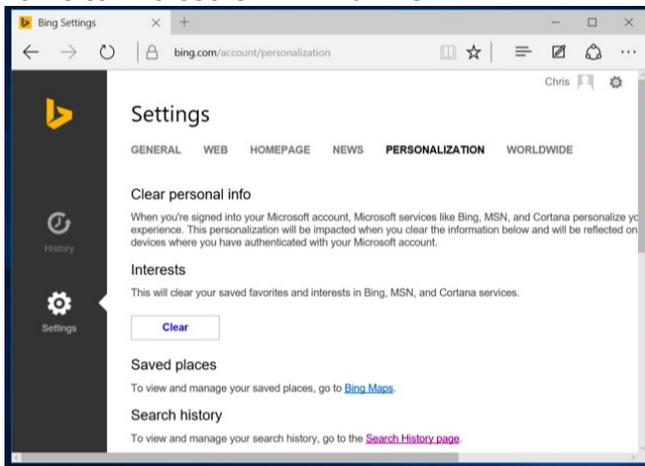
- **Personal history and interests** – You can clear personal info and "interests" in Bing, MSN, and Cortana from the <https://bing.com/account/personalization> page.
- **Bing search history** – Search using Windows 10's Start menu and the Bing search in Edge and you'll build up a Bing search history tied to your Microsoft account. You can view and clear this history from <https://bing.com/profile/history>.

Windows Update, Store, and Activation

While it's not technically "phoning home," [Windows Update](#) uses your upload bandwidth by default to upload Windows Updates to other users. It's a bit like BitTorrent, and similar to how Blizzard's Battle.net downloader distributes game updates. These settings can be controlled under Settings > Update & security > Windows Update > Advanced options > Choose how updates are delivered. You can make Windows only share updates with PCs on your local network, not the entire Internet.

- **Windows Update** – Windows 10 Home requires you install security, driver, and feature updates automatically, and you can only [prevent Windows 10 from automatically downloading updates](#) by setting your device's connections a metered connection or upgrading to Windows 10 Pro. Thankfully, there is at least a way to [block updates you don't want](#).
- **Windows Store** – The Windows Store will automatically check in with Microsoft and download new versions of included universal apps like Microsoft Edge. Even Cortana and the Start menu can be updated via the Windows Store.
- **Windows Activation** – Windows still includes [Windows Activation](#), which checks in with Microsoft's servers to ensure you're using a properly licensed and activated version of Windows.

Wi-Fi Sense

The [Wi-Fi sense feature](#) is enabled by default, and it will automatically connect to suggested open hotspots and network your Outlook.com, Skype, and Facebook contacts have shared with you.

- **Wi-Fi Sense** – These options can be controlled under Settings > Wi-Fi > Manage Wi-Fi settings. Note that Windows 10 won't actually share your Wi-Fi network's passphrase with anyone else unless you choose to manually share that individual network. However, if you give a friend access your passphrase and they connect and click the Share option, they could share it with their entire network of Facebook, Skype, and Outlook.com email contacts and give them access to your Wi-Fi network.

This is just a conservative list, and probably isn't complete. There are many other ways Windows 10 arguably phones home. Windows 10 includes apps for a variety of Microsoft services: Cortana, Bing, Outlook.com, OneDrive, Groove Music, MSN, and Xbox. Each of these services may have its own privacy policy and store data about you in a different place if you use them.

And, again, this isn't unusual in this day and age. Whether you love it or hate it — actually, it's more like you're indifferent to it or hate it — many operating systems and services now function this way. What's new here is Windows is jumping on board. Many of these features were already present on Windows 8 and 8.1, too.

But Microsoft could certainly do a better job of putting these options in a single place and better explaining them, though. They're scattered not just across Windows 10's interface, but across a variety of different Microsoft websites.

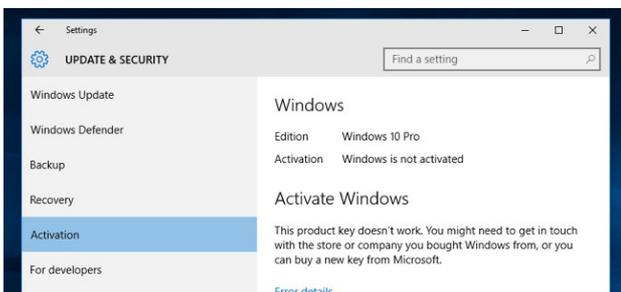

How to Use Your Free Windows 10 License After Changing Your PC's Hardware- Bill Maxwell



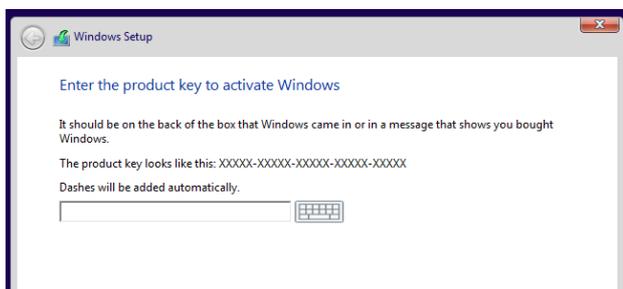
The free Windows 10 license you receive is tied to your PC's hardware. You're still allowed to use Windows 10 on that same PC even after changing its hardware, but that may not be clear. Microsoft won't give you a product key.

Microsoft really doesn't want to explain how the activation process works. It doesn't want to give pirates too much information, but that does make the licensing process confusing for legitimate users, too.

How Windows Licences and Activation Usually Work

The free Windows 10 license works very differently from previous Windows licensing systems. These all required a product key. Even modern Windows 8 and 8.1 PCs — and new PCs that come with Windows 10 — [have a Windows product key embedded in their UEFI firmware](#). If you buy a new copy of Windows 10 — for example, to install it on a PC you're building yourself — you'll also have a product key.

In this case, the product key would always serve to [activate Windows](#). But Microsoft hasn't been handing out Windows 10 product keys to upgraders. There's no way to find your Windows 10 product key if you've upgraded for free — you just don't have one.



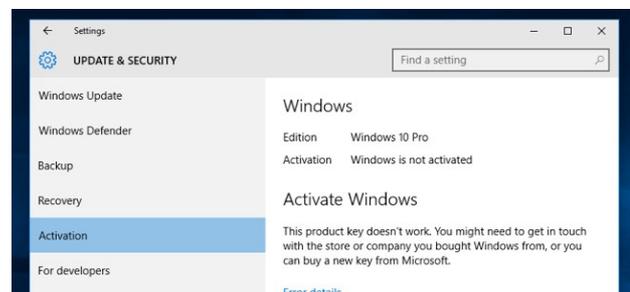
How the Free Windows 10 License Works

The free Windows 10 license Microsoft is providing to upgraders works differently. Microsoft won't issue you a Windows 10 product key. Instead, when you perform an upgrade from within Windows 7 Service Pack 1 or Windows 8.1, the upgrade process registers a unique ID associated with your PC's hardware on Microsoft's Windows activation servers.

In the future, whenever you install Windows 10 on that same PC, it will automatically report to Microsoft's activation servers. Microsoft will confirm that the PC with that specific hardware configuration is allowed to use Windows 10, and it'll automatically be activated.

This isn't actually made clear in the installation process itself. To clean-install Windows 10 on a machine activated in this way, you have to continually skip all the product key prompts while installing it.

This automatic process only works if your PC has the same hardware it had when you upgraded to Windows 10.



What if You Change Your PC's Hardware?

Microsoft has never actually wanted to explain exactly how the hardware-based Windows activation process works. Just [replacing your hard drive](#) or upgrading your graphics card shouldn't cause a problem. If you've just changed a few peripherals, Windows 10 may just automatically activate itself after you [clean-install it](#).

However, replacing your computer's motherboard or CPU will likely be so big a change that it prevents the PC from automatically activating. Windows 10 will see it as a different hardware configuration, one which isn't allowed to have the free upgrade.

If you run into this problem, you should just be able to clean-install Windows 10 normally. Skip both prompts when you're asked to enter a product key. After it installs, it will attempt to activate itself with Microsoft and won't automatically activate. It will be considered non-genuine until you activate it. The activation screen will prompt you to purchase a new license from the Windows Store.

According to Gabriel Aul, Vice President of Engineering for the Windows & Devices group at Microsoft, you can then contact support from within Windows 10, explain the situation, and they'll activate Windows 10 for you:

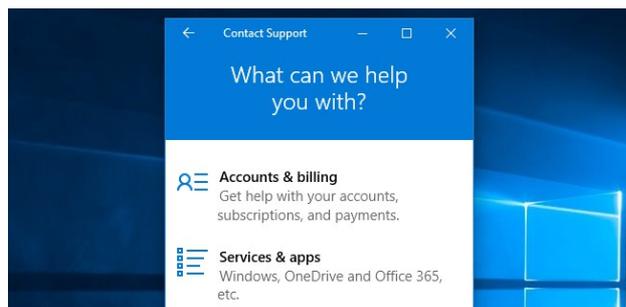

To do this, you should be able to open the Start menu, select All Apps, and launch the Contact Support app included with Windows 10. Navigate to the Services & apps > Windows > Setting up category, which includes activation issues. You can text-chat with a Microsoft support representative here or have a Microsoft representative call you on the phone.

The free Windows 10 license isn't tied to a Microsoft account at all — it's just tied to the PC's hardware configuration. However, we assume that it might help if you sign into the PC with the same Microsoft account you signed in with on your old PC. That would give Microsoft Support some way to confirm you previously had a free Windows 10 license on that PC. That's just a guess, of course — Microsoft isn't saying exactly what is required here.



Bear in mind that this will only work on the same PC. This does create some an inconvenient situation for people who bought [a full retail license — not an OEM license](#) — of Windows 7, 8, or 8.1. Most people don't do this, though — even people building their own PCs usually seem to buy OEM copies of Windows.

Those retail licenses are portable between different PCs, so you can take them with you from PC to PC. You might have purchased a Windows 7 license and built your own PC. Build a new PC a few years later and you can take that Windows 7 license with you as long as you remove it from the first machine. Rinse and repeat over and over — as long as you'd like to continue using Windows 7.

However, that free Windows 10 license you get as part of the upgrade process is tied to an individual PC. Even if you upgraded from a retail copy of Windows 7, 8, or 8.1, you won't be given a retail copy of Windows 10. You just can't move that free Windows 10 license to another PC. After the first year is up and the free Windows 10 upgrade offer is over, you'll have to buy a

new copy of Windows 10 if you want to move it to an entirely different PC.

This may feel a bit inconvenient. But, on the other hand, that Windows 10 license was just a free bonus in the first place. Retail licenses of Windows 10 you purchase can be moved between PCs in the same way.

Microsoft's solution here is to hand this responsibility off to its support department, who can activate Windows for you. There's no automatic process and no product key to help you. It's a bit like calling Microsoft on the phone to activate previous editions of Windows — but at least you had a product key to help you in that scenario. Hopefully Microsoft's support people are trained well enough to handle this properly.



Mozilla Firefox removes option to change New Tab Page URL - Bill Maxwell

Users of the Firefox web browser have had options until now to replace the default New Tab page of Firefox with a custom one using the built-in preference `browser.newtab.url`.

Mozilla noted some time ago that the useful feature was abused by companies who replaced the New Tab page in the browser with a custom version, for instance during software installations as [third-party offers](#) but also in malicious ways.

That's why the organization made the decision to remove the preference `browser.newtab.url` from Firefox 41.

While it is certainly improving user protection, as hijackers won't be able to use the preference anymore to modify the new tab page in Firefox using it, it is removing an option from Firefox that some users used to customize the browser's New Tab Page.

The change, which just rolled out in the most recent Nightly version of the web browser affects users who modified the preference manually or through add-ons. Those who have customized the New Tab page will notice that the customization does not work anymore after they upgrade Firefox 41.

Now when you click to open a New Tab, Firefox will display it's own search Bar and a list of web pages previously visited. Clicking on the Cog ICON in the Upper right corner allows some changes to be made on what is displayed.



Scammers offering 'dislike' buttons for Facebook:

Stay Smart Online - Alert Priority Moderate

A number of scams have been seen that pretend to provide 'dislike' buttons for Facebook users. These scams will enable malicious individuals to access your account, post scam on your news feed, and ask for personal information.

The scams follow an official announcement by Facebook that they will be providing a button to offer different ways for people to express empathy and interact with a post. This has been mistakenly referred to in the media as a 'dislike' button. The purpose is to provide an option for people to support negative posts, such as a pet dying, as opposed to "liking" the post.

Fake National Australia Bank 'Monthly Report' Email Contains Malware

According to this email, which purports to be from an Accounting Department Specialist at the National Australia Bank (NAB), your monthly account report is included in an attached file.

However, the email is a scam. NAB did not send it. At first glance, the email may seem to be a typical [phishing scam](#) designed to trick you into divulging your account information via a fake web form.

In this case, however, the attachment contains malware rather than a phishing form.

Opening the attached .zip file reveals an 'account review' .exe file. If you click this .exe file, [malware can be installed](#) on your computer. Once installed, the malware can then attempt to download a large amount of other malware. This malware may steal your banking and social media account login information and send it to criminals waiting online.

In some cases, ransomware may be downloaded. Ransomware can lock the files on your computer so that you can no longer access them and then demand that you pay a fee to receive an unlock key.

Be very wary of any unsolicited email from your bank that instructs you to click a link or open an attached file to update details or view account information.

Epson packs in two years of ink into new printers

You might not want to admit it, but the printer isn't dead yet, and chances are when you do want to print, you're either out of ink or just about to. But with a new range from Epson, that's very unlikely to happen.

And that's because this range includes a rather interesting take on the ink cartridge, relying on a special formulation of ink in a specially designed cartridge that more resembles a bottle, which in turn works with some rather nifty technology inside the printer to maximise ink output.

As a result of this combination of technologies, Epson has managed to make this line of printers — called the "EcoTank" models — print up to 4000 pages in black and up to 6500 pages in colour, all before the ink runs out.
