Gimp turns 20

(From Linux Format January 2016)

Over twenty years ago Peter Mattis and Spencer Kimball developed the General Image Manipulation Program with the first public release in Jan 96. Abbreviated to the always fun-to-Google-at-work *Gimp*, the first release was compatible with Unix systems like Linux. However since then it has been ported to Windows, Mac OS X and other operating systems. It has also had its name changed (with the blessing of Richard Stallman) to GNU Image Manipulation Program.

To celebrate the twentieth anniversary of when Peter Mattis announced the availability of *General Image Manipulation Program* on Usenet (which can be read at <http://bit.ly/GimpHistory>) a new revised of *Gimp* (2.8.16 – which can be downloaded from <http://www.gimp.org/downloads>) has been released.

The new version includes support for layer groups in OpenRaster files, fixes for layer groups in PSD, interface improvements OSX build system fixes and more.

The *Gimp* website (www.gimp.org) has also been given a redesign by Pat David, making it better for viewing on mobile devices with a full RSS/Atom feed for news items.

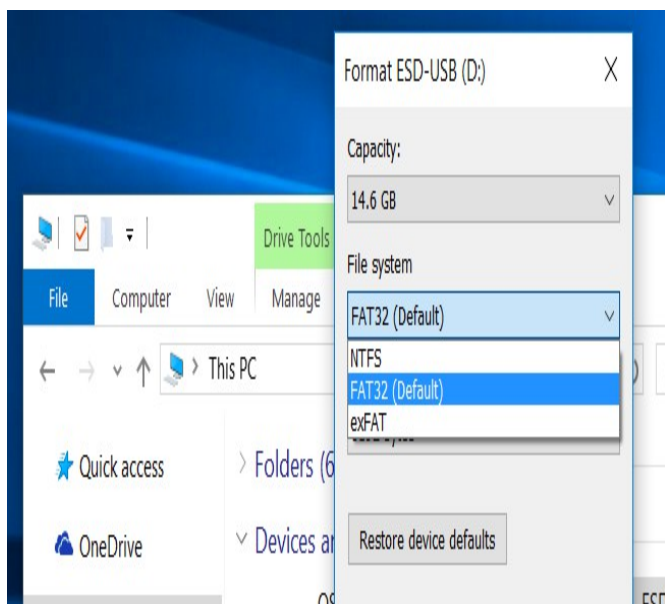

What is the Difference Between FAT32, exFAT, and NTFS? - Bill Maxwell



Whether you're formatting an internal drive, external drive, USB flash drive, or SD card, Windows will give you the choice of NTFS, FAT32, and exFAT. The Format dialogue in Windows doesn't explain the difference, so we will.

FAT32 is an older file system that's largely relegated to USB flash drives and other external drives. Windows uses NTFS for its system drive, and it's also ideal for other internal drives. exFAT is a modern replacement for FAT32, and more devices support it than do NTFS — although it's not as widespread as FAT32.

FAT32 is the oldest file system here. It was introduced all the way back in Windows 95 to replace the older FAT16 file system.

This file system's age has advantages and disadvantages. Because it's so old, it's the de-facto standard. Flash drives you purchase will often come formatted with FAT32 for maximum compatibility across not just modern computers, but other devices like game consoles and anything with a USB port.

Limitations come with that age, however. Individual ***files on a FAT32 drive can't be over 4 GB in size — that's the maximum.*** A FAT32 partition must also be less than 8 TB, which is less of a limitations — but still a noticeable one if you have a new, high-capacity mechanical drive.

While this file system is okay for USB flash drives and other external media, you won't want to use this for an internal drive. It lacks the permissions and other security features built into the more modern NTFS file

system. Modern versions of Windows can no longer be installed to FAT32, and must be installed onto drives formatted with NTFS.

Compatibility: Works with all versions of Windows, Mac, Linux, game consoles, and practically anything with a USB port. Some Android Tablets will only read FAT32 USB drives.

Limits: 4 GB maximum file size, 8 TB maximum partition size.

Ideal Use: Use it on removable drives for maximum compatibility with the widest range of devices, assuming you don't have any files 4 GB or larger in size.

NTFS is the modern file system Windows likes to use. When you install Windows, it formats your system drive with the NTFS file system. NTFS has file size and partition size limits that are so theoretically huge you won't run up against them. NTFS first appeared in consumer versions of Windows with Windows XP.

Aside from these limitations, NTFS is packed with other modern features. It supports file permissions for security, a change journal that can help quickly recover errors if your computer crashes, shadow copies for backups, encryption, disk quota limits, hard links, and other various features. Many of these are crucial for an operating system drive — especially file permissions.

Your Windows system partition must be NTFS. If you have a secondary drive alongside Windows and you plan on installing programs to it, you should probably go ahead and make it NTFS, too.

However, NTFS just isn't as compatible with other operating systems. It'll work with all recent versions of Windows — all the way back to Windows XP — but it has limited compatibility with other operating systems. By default, Mac OS X can only read NTFS drives, not write to them. Some Linux distributions may enable Ghost-writing support, but some may be read-only. None of Sony's Play Station consoles support NTFS. Even Microsoft's own Xbox 360 can't read NTFS drives, although the new Xbox One can. Other devices are even less likely to support NTFS. Android Tablets no not support NTFS.

Compatibility: Works with all versions of Windows, but read-only with Mac by default, and may be read-only by default with some 1850 Linux distributions. Other devices — with the exception of Microsoft's Xbox One — probably won't support NTFS.

What is the Difference Between FAT32, exFAT, and NTFS? - Bill Maxwell

Limits: No realistic file-size or partition size limits.

Ideal Use: Use it for your Windows system drive and other internal drives that will just be used with Windows.

exFAT was introduced in 2006, and was added to older versions of Windows with updates to Windows XP and Windows Vista.

It's a file system optimized for flash drives. It's designed to be a lightweight file system like FAT32 without all NTFS's extra features and overhead, but without FAT32's limitations.

Like NTFS, exFAT has very large file size and partition size limits. This means you can store files that are larger than 4 GB apiece on a flash drive or SD card if it's formatted with exFAT. exFAT is a strict upgrade over FAT32, and should be the best choice for external drives where you want a lightweight file system without FAT32's file size limits.

exFAT is also more compatible than NTFS. While Mac OS X includes only read-only support for NTFS, Macs offer full read-write support for exFAT. exFAT drives can be accessed on Linux by installing the appropriate software.

While exFAT is compatible with Macs — and will be compatible with some devices that don't support NTFS, like digital cameras — it still isn't quite as compatible. Microsoft's own Xbox 360 doesn't support it, although the Xbox One does. The Play Station 3 doesn't support exFAT drives, although the Play Station 4 reportedly does. Various other older devices may only support FAT32 instead of exFAT.

Compatibility: Works with all versions of Windows and modern versions of Mac OS X, but requires additional software on Linux. More devices support exFAT than support NTFS, but some — particularly older ones — may only support FAT32.

Limits: No realistic file-size or partition-size limits.

Ideal Use: Use it for USB flash drives and other external drives, especially if you need files of over 4 GB in size. Assuming every device you want to use the drive with supports exFAT, you should format your device with exFAT instead of FAT32.



MONTHLY TECH TERM: **BLUETOOTH**

This wireless technology enables communication between Bluetooth-compatible devices. It is used for short-range connections between desktop and laptop computers, digital cameras, scanners, cellular phones, and printers.

Because the technology is based on radio waves, there can be objects or even walls placed between the communicating devices and the connection won't be disrupted. Also, Bluetooth uses a standard 2.4 GHz frequency so that all Bluetooth-enabled devices will be compatible with each other. The only drawback of Bluetooth is that, because of its high frequency, its range is limited to 30 feet. While this is easily enough for transferring data within the same room, if you are walking in your back yard and want to transfer the address book from your cell phone to your computer in your house, you might be out of luck. However, the short range can be seen as a positive aspect as well, since it adds to the security of Bluetooth communication.

What if someone asks to arrange payment through email or off the Airbnb website?

While the vast majority of transactions are incident-free, it's good to know what to look for to avoid any potential payment scams.

All legitimate payments on Airbnb take place through the website. If someone messages you on Airbnb and asks you to contact them off-site to arrange payment details, please do not attempt to communicate or pay off-site.

You can report people who ask you to do this by flagging the message—just look for the small flag icon in your message thread:

Airbnb will never ask you to pay through your email. If you receive a personal email from anyone (including an automated@airbnb.com or any other username@airbnb.com email address) asking you to pay or accept payment off-site, immediately report by email to: safety@airbnb.com and end communication with the sender.
