Treasurer's Report

The Treasurer's Report for the period 21 July 2016 to 20 August 2016 as shown on the screen was published in the September 2016 edition of Bits'N'Bytes.

General Business:

Peter informed the meeting that the Club Rules were being revised in accordance with the current Model Rules from the Fair Trading Department of the Government. One of the reasons that the Club Rules needed amendment was to enable to the Club to make payment of accounts by electronic means instead of by cheque as is the current practice. The Committee had approved the proposed changes which now had to be adopted by a meeting of members of the Club.

Major changes are:

- 1) Paragraph 44.4 A payment by the association of \$100 or more must be made by cheque or electronic funds transfer.
- 2) Paragraph 5.2 Amended to read Life Members (previously Honorary Members)
- 3) Paragraph 8.2 Admission and rejection of new members – Advice to be given to new members that the Club has public liability insurance,

NoScript Essential to Web Surfing - Peter Daley

At present, the hacker black market is paying good money for hacked Australian computers. That's correct, there is a black market for hacked computers, and Australian computers are fetching top dollar, compared to other countries. Why do you think that Australian computers are getting top dollar? It's because we are easy targets as most of you don't take computer security seriously enough, plus being an affluent country, the hackers can make better money from a hacked Aussie.

You can secure your computer with all the modern, up-to-date security tools, but if you don't follow safe practices, you're very likely to get hacked or ripped off. It's just like driving a new car, with all the latest safety features, air bags and intelligent braking systems, if you drive dangerously, you're more likely to crash and get injured. You need to use some common sense on the Internet, and stay away from sites that are notorious for hacking visitors computers, pornography, software cracks, copy violated music sharing and movie sites etc.

One other major treat used by hackers is to break in through security holes in web browser programs. They can use malicious scripts hidden in web pages to exploit vulnerabilities in any web browser, being used on any OS. This poses a serious threat to all operating systems Windows, Apple and Linux. So it is also important to constantly update your web browser to the latest version.

Another way to defend yourself against this sort of threat is to turn off all scripts. Unfortunately scripts are so wide spread that if you do this you can lose a lot of web page functionality. Alternatively you can use the Mozilla Firefox web browser downloadable from here, <http://www.mozilla.com> and install a Firefox Add-on called "NoScript", this will effectively block all scripts in pages you visit. You then use NoScript to choose when to allow scripts.

Once Mozilla Firefox is downloaded and installed on your computer, and you are connected to the Internet, click on the menu item "Tools", and in the pop down box, click "Add Ons". When an "Add-ons" box appears, click on the "Get Add-ons" tab. **(Right click next to the last open tab open in Firefox if you can't see the "Menu bar", and tick "Menu Bar" in the pop up box that will appear, to turn it on.)**

In the search box at the top left of this box, type in "NoScript" and click the "Search" button, then when the NoScript add-on description appears click its "Install" button. The NoScript extension will be installed. Once it is installed, you will need to shut down, and re-open

the Firefox browser before NoScript will become active.

(When you re-open Firefox I suggest you read the information about NoScript that will appear in a tab window in Firefox.)

After installing NoScript, go to "Tools" "Add-ons" menu item in Mozilla Firefox. The menu bar is at the top of the Firefox open window. Find NoScript in the "Extensions" list under Add-ons, and click on NoScript's "Preferences" button. Now click on the "Appearance" tab and click on the "Status Bar" box. Now when you visit web pages a status bar will appear at the bottom of the Firefox browser window. In the status bar a NoScript "Options" button will be located in the bottom right hand corner. The Status bar will also show how many scripts are in the page that are being blocked

Blocking all the scripts will speed up your web surfing because you will not need to wait until all the fancy stuff loads. It will also mean you will need to make wise decisions on when to allow scripts in web pages. I suggest not allowing any scripts in pages unless you really need the service. For instance, if you go to your web bank service with NoScript you will not be able to log in until you tell NoScript to "Allow the bank site", by clicking on the NoScript Options button. So login boxes for services, plus Flash, Silverlight, and Java scripts will be blocked until you click the NoScript allow site, or temporary allow option, when visiting any site. If you use it with another Firefox Add-on WOT, (Web Of Trust) a web site rating service it can make those decisions easier to make.


Statistically 1 in 9 web sites are dangerous at present! So using NoScript wisely can provide a lot of protection, no matter what operating system you use!

Getting Help on Operating Systems and Programs

The Help files provided by operating systems Windows, Apple and Linux and software packages contain a wealth of information. With all operating systems it is important to become conversant with how to locate the Help and Support for the operating system being used.



Most software program installed on a computer will have the word 'Help' in the menu list generally at the right hand end of the list of titles at the top of a page of an opened program. Click on the word Help and a drop down list will have words there to click on to see contents of the Help file for the particular program. This list often contains a title 'About ..(program name)' which will provide information about which version of the program is the one being used. On an Apache OpenOffice program a left click on 'OpenOffice Help' will open the Help for the section of OpenOffice being used (Basic, Calc, Chart, Base, Draw, Impress, Math, Writer). There is a choice of searching through tabs such as 'Contents' 'Index' 'Find' and 'Bookmarks' for each of the parts of OpenOffice. (For information on Bookmarks right click on the word Bookmark and press the F1 Key).

If there is no menu list at the top of the opening page there will generally be somewhere on the opening page of a program with words 'Help' or 'Support'

If the help within the program does not give the information required then the Internet will have more than enough help by doing a search by using one of the search engines available – Google – being a particular favourite or use others such as Yahoo, Amazon, Wikipedia etc. After entering the word or words that help is needed on in the search bar, some results will be shown but now the results can be further refined by clicking on the words below the search bar for sorting help by - All, News, Images, Shopping, Videos, More (A drop down shows Maps, Books, Apps), Search Tools extends to show Any Country, Any Times, All Results.

If the first attempt does not bring the exact subject help is needed on, try using a different word or words to cover what you are searching for.

Currently there are many sites which will offer You Tube

videos to show step by step actions. When using the search engine of your choice search for 'Videos' if you like to follow screen shots of 'how to'. Remember that the first video you watch may not be the easiest to follow so look at further videos. Check also on how long ago the video was made as this may not be relevant to the version of the program being used but often it gives the clue to Help needed.

If all that fails - "Phone a Friend" or attend a Club Meeting!!

New Shortcuts in Windows 10

From window management with Snap and Task View to virtual desktops and the Command Prompt, there are lots of new goodies for keyboard users in Windows 10. Here are some new keyboard shortcuts for Windows 10

Window Snapping

Windows 10 offers improved support for Snap — known as “Aero Snap” on Windows 7. You can now snap windows vertically — one on top of each other, instead of side-by-side — or snap windows to a 2x2 grid.

- **Windows Key + Left** – Snap current window to the left side of the screen.
- **Windows Key + Right** – Snap current window the right side of the screen.
- **Windows Key + Up** – Snap current window to the top of the screen.
- **Windows Key + Down** – Snap current window to the bottom of the screen.

Combine these shortcuts to snap into a corner — for example, Windows Key + Left and then Windows Key + Up would snap a window into the top-left quadrant of the screen. The first two keyboard shortcuts aren't new, but the way they work with the 2x2 snapping feature is.

(You can also use the mouse — drag and drop a window to the left or right edges of your screen, or drag and drop them into one of the four corners to snap into quadrants.)

Task View / Window Management

The Task View is a new interface that combined an Exposé-like window switching and virtual desktops — an awful lot like Mission Control on Mac OS X. In addition to clicking the “Task View” button on the taskbar to open it, you can use these keyboard shortcuts:

- **Windows Key + Tab** – This opens the new Task View interface, and it stays open — you can release the keys. Only windows from your current virtual desktop will appear in the Task View list, and you can use the virtual desktop switcher at the bottom of the screen to switch between virtual desktops.
- **Alt + Tab** – This isn't a new keyboard shortcut, and it works just like you'd expect it to. Pressing Alt+Tab lets you switch between your open Windows. Tap Tab again to flip between windows and release the keys to select a window. Alt+Tab now uses the new Task View-style larger thumbnails. Unlike Windows Key + Tab, Alt + Tab lets you switch between open windows on all virtual desktops.

Virtual Desktops

There are also some keyboard shortcuts for quickly managing virtual desktops.


- **Windows Key + Ctrl + D** – Create a new virtual desktop and switch to it
- **Windows Key + Ctrl + F4** – Close the current virtual desktop.
- **Windows Key + Ctrl + Left / Right** – Switch to the virtual desktop on the left or right. *****

Selecting Text / Shift Key Shortcuts work in the Command Prompt! These include:

- **Shift + Left / Right / Up / Down** - Moves the cursor left a character, right a character, up a line, or down a line, selecting the text along the way. Continue pressing arrow keys to select more text.
- **Ctrl + Shift + Left / Right** – Moves the cursor one word to the left or right, selecting that word along the way.
- **Shift + Home / End** – Moves the cursor to the beginning or end of the current line, selecting text along the way.
- **Shift + Page Up / Page Down** – Moves the cursor up or down a screen, selecting text.
- **Ctrl + Shift + Home / End** - Moves the cursor to the beginning or end of the “screen buffer,” selecting all text between the cursor and the beginning or end of the Command Prompt's output.

Some More Shortcuts:

- **Windows Key + X** - Open *Start* button context menu
- **Windows Key + I** - Open Windows 10 settings



*The keyboard shortcut **Windows key + Tab** opens the Windows 10 Task View.*

Committee Member - Chris Phillips




Chris will be well known to members at Caloundra where he regularly attends meetings.

Tech Terms



MONTHLY TECH TERM: NETWORKS

Local Area networks:

A network is any collection of independent computers that exchange information with each other over a shared communication medium. Local Area Networks or LANs are usually confined to a limited geographic area, such as a single building or a college campus. LANs can be small, linking as few as three computers, but can often link hundreds of computers used by thousands of people. The development of standard networking protocols and media has resulted in worldwide proliferation of LANs throughout business and educational organizations.

Wireless Local Area Networks (WLANs):

Wireless LANs, or WLANs, use radio frequency (RF) technology to transmit and receive data over the air. This minimizes the need for wired connections. WLANs give users mobility as they allow connection to a local area network without having to be physically connected by a cable. This freedom means 2539 users can access shared resources

without looking for a place to plug in cables, provided that their terminals are mobile and within the designated network coverage area. With mobility, WLANs give flexibility and increased productivity, appealing to both business and to home users. WLANs may also enable network administrators to connect devices that may be physically difficult to reach with a cable.

The Institute for Electrical and Electronic Engineers (IEEE) developed the 802.11 specification for wireless LAN technology. 802.11 specifies over-the-air interface between a wireless client and a base station, or between two wireless clients. WLAN 802.11 standards also have security protocols that were developed to provide the same level of security as that of a wired LAN





Alerts

Microsoft, Adobe, and Apple have released security updates for products used on computers, smartphones, tablets and other systems including smartwatches.

Stay Smart Online

Alert priority - High. 14 September 2016.

Security updates addresses vulnerabilities in systems that remote attackers can otherwise use to gain access to devices, or information such as online banking details. A vulnerability is a weakness that can leave a device and its systems open to attack. Attacks can be carried out a number of ways, including through malicious software (malware), such as viruses and spyware, that can monitor a users' activity on a computer and stop systems operating properly.

Stay Smart Online recommends that, wherever possible, you enable functions that allow security updates to be automatically applied when they become available. Automatic updates minimise the risk of you delaying or forgetting to apply an update, and help restrict the ability of attackers to gain control of your computer and sensitive personal data.

If you choose not to install updates automatically, you should review the information below to see if any products you use are affected. If they are affected, you should manually install the updates as soon as possible to minimise the risk of being attacked.

Apple has issued advice and released security updates for watchOS, Xcode and iOS. You are advised to review the Apple advisories and apply the necessary updates.

Microsoft has released its monthly aggregated update for a range of widely used software products, including Microsoft Windows, Internet Explorer and Microsoft Office. You are advised to review the Microsoft Security Bulletin for September 2016 and apply the necessary updates.

Adobe has released bulletins describing security updates to address vulnerabilities in Flash Player, Digital Editions and Air SDK & Compiler software. You are advised to read the Adobe Security Bulletins and follow the instructions to apply the necessary updates.

Popular web and blogging platform **WordPress** has also advised users to update as soon as possible to the newly released version 4.6.1 which addresses several vulnerabilities.

It has three sensors which apparently help with taking sharp pictures of moving objects, then there's laser autofocus that'll also help keep things sharp.



For selfies there's a 13MP camera on the front. Sony says that the phone offers 4K recording, but doesn't say whether that's with the front or rear camera or both.

The 5.2 inch display offers a Full HD 1080p picture using Sony's Triluminous display technology. The phone is IP65/IP68 rated for dust and water protection. Not suitable for swimming, but it should be okay in the rain. The screen uses Corning Gorilla glass.
