So far we have not been able to ascertain if the two telephone lines into the club for the two telephones in the building are coming in as a dual line or joined as a single line. Telecom should be able to answer this question, however they are off loading us onto our service provider Internode, who in turn is saying it is Telstra business.

As we are a long way from the telephone exchange, we are not getting a good download of data.

Peter has approached our service provider and asked about a commercial system. This would answer our needs of 20 MG guaranteed speed at a cost of \$1,100 installation and \$300 per month for the data download. There is also an option for another upgrade if required for an additional cost.

Peter has also looked into 3126 other systems from Telstra, Optus and Flash Fibre who have promised to get back to Peter.

Whatever is decided on would require permission from the Council.

Peter will follow up on any other answers to our problem and report back to the Club.

Streaming Internet Radio, a Great Way to Keep In Touch - Peter Daley



There are large numbers of people who have moved to the Sunshine Coast and would like to have some sort of contact or information with their previous home. Well a good way to do this is to use Internet radio to listen to the local radio from your previous location in Australia or from Overseas.

You don't need a short wave radio to do this, or have to worry about weather conditions interfering with your reception. Plus you can have moved from pretty well anywhere in the world, and listen to your favourite radio station on your computer or by wireless throughout your house. Be aware, depending on the download bit rate of the radio stream, it will come down at around 20 to 60 meg an hour. So you need a good download limit if you're going to listen for hours!

The easiest and least expensive way to do this is to simply use your broadband Internet connection to stream down the signal. In Australia you can find a list of on line live streaming radio stations here.

<http://www.australianliveradio.com/>

This site is very easy to use. It's divided up in to states, and hardly needs any skill to get it working. Click in the station you want to play. Once you do this, the station's web address appears above. The radio playback is built into the page that opens.



Wireless option 1

If you want to stream this to your FM radio you have in the house, you can purchase an FM wireless transmitter that you plug into the speaker output of your computer. This sends the signal out at a set FM frequency throughout the house. These are often sold as accessories to you MP3 players so you can play the MP3 player music through your FM radio in your car. All you need to do is to tune the FM radios you already have in the house, to that frequency, and you can then listen to the Internet broadcast anywhere by wireless in the house.



Wireless option 2

There are now a few dedicated Internet wireless devices that you can purchase. They work independently of your computer and look like a transistor radio, plus have normal clock radio functions. You simply plug these devices into the broadband connection and they will stream the signal, no computer necessary. They have thousands of pre-programmed Internet stations, plus you can add more. These devices can work wirelessly, so you may also have the added expense of having to install a wireless router onto your broadband modem, if you don't already have one.

I personally like to tune into the ABC radio at <http://www.abc.net.au>. Here you can tune into any of the nation wide ABC radio stations, national, Classical, Jazz, Pop and Country. I chill out listening to the Classic Drive on ABC Classic FM in the evening.

Some 'Phone Facts - How Are Cell Phones Different From Smartphones?

There are a mixture of technical names given to what is commonly call a 'Mobile' . These could include cell, mobile or smartphone (alternate spelling – smart phone) and all are different.

Cell phone - Alternatively referred to as a cell, cellular, and cellular phone, sometimes abbreviated as cp is a mobile or portable phone. It enables a user to communicate almost anywhere in the world. The cell phone was invented by Dr. Martin Cooper, along with his team of developers at Motorola making the first cell phone call on 3 Apr 73. The first cell phone weighed 2.4 pounds and was 9 inches long.

Modern cell phones have changed drastically from the original cell phones (aka bricks). New cell phones are much lighter than the old brick cell phones, much smaller, and have LCD (often a colour LCD) to display contacts, pictures, ringtones, apps, games, etc.

Smartphone - IBM designed the first smartphone in 1992. It was called Simon. The smartphone was presented that year as a concept device in Las Vegas at the computer industry trade show known as COMDEX.

Today, many cell phones are called smartphones and are capable of doing almost anything a computer is capable of doing. Below, are just a few examples of what some of the new phones are capable of doing via the operating system, software, web access, QWERTY keyboard (keys are laid out in the same manner they would be on your computer keyboard.)etc.

Take and make calls to any other person with a phone

Send and receive text messages

- Take, view, and store pictures and videos using a built-in camera
- Access the Internet, e-mail, chat, and even download apps for the phone
- Play games and have access to common programs, such as a calculator, contacts, calendar, clock, to-do list, etc.
- Remotely control other devices connected to the Internet or connected via Bluetooth
- Store and run files
- Play music and watch movies

There is no standard definition of the term "smartphone" across the industry.

All cell phones can send and receive text messages, but what sets a smartphone apart is its ability to send and receive e-mail. Some smartphones can support multiple e-mail accounts. Others include access to the popular instant messaging services, like AOL's AIM and Yahoo! Messenger.

Smartphones Have a Mobile Operating System such as Windows Mobile, iPhone OS / iOS (Apple), Google's Android, BlackBerry OS, Palm OS, Linux and more.

You can think of a smartphone like a miniature computer that can also place and receive calls.

These are just some of the features that make a smartphone smart. The technology surrounding smartphones and cell phones is constantly changing, though. What constitutes a smartphone today may change by next week, next month or next year.

Cybercrime is an issue which affects many Australians. As Australia's reliance on technology grows, the cost and incidence of cybercrime is expected to increase.

The Australian Cybercrime Online Reporting Network (ACORN) is a national policing initiative of the Commonwealth, State and Territory governments. It is a national online system that allows the public to securely report instances of cybercrime. It will also provide advice to help people recognise and avoid common types of cybercrime.

The ACORN is a key initiative under the National Plan to Combat Cybercrime, which sets out how Australian agencies are working together to make Australia a harder target for cybercriminals. The ACORN has been designed to make it easier to report cybercrime and help develop a better understanding of the cybercrime affecting Australians. By understanding the enablers of cybercrime, we can make it harder and less rewarding to commit cybercrime.

Staying safe

Prevention is the best antidote to ransomware and other malware attacks.

1. Use spam filters and be cautious when opening emails, especially if there are attachments.
2. Make sure you are using a reputable security software product.
3. Make sure it is up-to-date and switched on.
4. Make sure your operating system and applications are up-to-date and fully patched.
5. Run a full scan of your computer—regularly – or preferably set it to run automatically.
6. Use strong and unique passwords.
7. Set passwords on all your hardware devices (modems and routers) and change them regularly – never leave the default, factory set password in place – it is usually 'admin'.
8. Back up your data regularly.
9. Keep a backup copy of your data in a safe place, disconnected from your computer and the internet, on a device that has been scanned.
10. Only visit reputable websites and online services.

**Apple iPhone 6s battery replacement announced
Gadget Guy, 23 November 2016.**

It looks like Apple is trying to sort out several iPhone issues at once. Days after announcing a (paid) fix to touch screen issues with some iPhone 6 Plus phones, it is providing replacement batteries for some iPhone 6s phones.

It says:

"Apple has determined that a very small number of iPhone 6s devices may unexpectedly shut down. This is not a safety issue and only affects devices within a limited serial number range that were manufactured between September and October 2015.

If you have experienced this issue, please visit an Apple Retail Store or an Apple Authorized Service Provider and have your device's serial number checked to confirm eligibility for a battery replacement, free of charge."

**Sony Xperia XZ mobile phone
Gadget Guy, 23 November 2016.**

Kudos to Sony for its latest and best premium phone, the Sony Xperia XZ. It stands out. It actually looks different.

This phone is almost entirely featureless, style wise.

The phone is 8.1mm thick – there is no camera bump – and 72mm wide and 146mm tall. The display is 5.2 inches with a full HD (1920 by 1080) resolution in 16:9 aspect ratio, so it tends to be a little taller by comparison to its width than most. There's a headphone/microphone socket on the top, power key to the right with the volume rocker underneath that and a "camera" key even further down. Hold that for a second and the camera fires up. Press it again and you take a picture. That edge of the phone is so well populated with keys, it can be tricky to apply the clamp of a selfie stick without causing mayhem.

The Sony Xperia XZ is water and dust resistant, with an IP65/68 rating. The "6" means it is completely dust tight, the "5" means it can cope with water jets (but not "powerful" ones) while the "8" means it can cope with immersion to more than a metre depth. All of which is pretty impressive.

The phone runs a Qualcomm Snapdragon 830 processor with 3GB of RAM and 32GB of built in

storage. The SIM tray also accommodates a micro SD card of up to 256GB capacity.

Conclusion

The Sony Xperia XZ is a fitting premium phone from this brand, fun and effective to use and with USB Type-C, looking somewhat towards the future. Do check it out.

PIZZAS will be falling from the skies!

Domino's Pizza plans to deliver food using drones, in partnership with Flirtey, with a commercial service launching early in 2017

The multi billion-dollar firm has trialed the world's first commercial pizza delivery in conjunction with an Australian founded drone firm, with plans to make flying food deliveries widely available early next year.

But there's a catch for Australian pizza lovers: drone deliveries will take place in New Zealand first due to the country's more "forward-thinking" drone laws.

The drone service, provided by aviation service Flirtey, would eventually allow customers to order one of four types of pizza from the Domino's app, and receive a notification when a drone had flown the food to their home, hovering overhead.

"When it's in the safety zone of your backyard, you will push a button in your app and it will come down attached to a cable," he said.

"As soon as it hits your hands, or a firm surface, it releases. All the technology is first class."
