Suggesting That Mp3, Or Aac Music Files Are Cd Quality Is Nonsense!- Peter Daley

Salesmen are suggesting that mp3 or AAC music files are CD quality. That's modern hype for you! Let's make it very clear, mp3 or AAC are not CD quality. It is a lossy format which means what you're listening to is a watered down version of the music. If you're going to pay 99c a track, why not purchase the full strength version.

Storage and download speeds have improved dramatically. Most of us now have access to super large hard drives, that are dirt cheap. Even iPods have huge drives now. There is no need to be putting up with mp3 or AAC sound quality any more. The only reason for using mp3 or AAC is to save room, and to speed up download times. They do this with a significant loss of sound quality. Mp3 and AAC leave out large bits of the original sound file to make the file size smaller.

If you want to save some space, you can use a free open source compression system called FLAC which will compress the music file without any loss in sound quality. FLAC is well supported by a lot of music download sites and music players. OK, it doesn't compress the music file as much as mp3 or AAC, but the sound quality on playback is at its best.



You can also use this great free tool called Exact Audio Copy which in its latest release supports FLAC compression. <http://www.exactaudiocopy.de>

There is an extra advantage in using EAC, the sound file you rip from your CD collection can sound better than the original CD itself. It takes longer to rip CDs at a high quality, but once this is done you have a music library of the best sound quality. Follow the set-up instructions at the EAC site for ripping CDs for the best sound quality. EAC even has a cool CD layout editor, so you can create your own personal music arrangement on a CD.

Get enlightened, and stop being short changed by falling for modern sales hype, and demand quality over quantity. Music is not just noise. It is to be enjoyed to its fullest. Most of you would protest severely if your knew you were being sold watered down beer. So why accept watered down music? At least with music you can get enjoyment without a hangover. 😊

Jean's Jottings

History of Sunshine Coast Computer Club Inc (Continued from Bits'N'Bytes April 2019).

During the years there have been changes in the format and locations of meetings of SCCC. The early meetings of the Club after its formation in September 1988 were held at the Caloundra State High School on one night per month, using one allocated room. Due to increase in numbers two meeting rooms were later used with members being given restricted use of School computers. In May 1999 due to the 3546 increase in numbers attending the monthly meeting this night time meeting moved to the Community Hall. After this move the Club rented the small meeting room (now our store room for computers etc) for providing two computers for hands on help before the monthly meetings. The nightly monthly meeting was changed to a daytime meeting commencing Saturday 5 February 2006. There were a number of reasons for this change. One of these was that it would give members who did not wish to drive at night a chance to attend.

The first Maroochydore club nightly meeting was held in September 1999, at the Life Line Counselling Centre in Duporth Ave, Maroochydore. The meeting was on the same format as the monthly night meeting held in Caloundra with two computers available for hands on help. There was a change of venue for the Maroochydore meeting in March 2000 with a move to the Uniting Church Hall in Millwell Road, In May 2000 there was another change in venue – this time to Millwell Road Community Centre, as the Church Hall was not big enough for the numbers attending. Day time Drop Ins commenced in Maroochydore in mid 2001 but due to problems with the availability of the Millwell Road Community Centre were moved to the Goodlife Centre in Buderim to cover the Buderim Maroochydore areas and were run there weekly. The night meetings at Maroochydore ceased after 17 November 2005. There was a drop off in attendance at the night meetings as members seemed to prefer attending the day time sessions at Buderim.

When the Club commenced meetings in the Noosa area at the Christian Outreach Centre in May 2003 a monthly meeting was held on the first Saturday of the month. Noosa Meetings ceased in September 2009, with the amalgamation of these meetings with the monthly meeting held at Yandina to cover the North Coast area of the Sunshine Coast.

Monthly meetings have been held at Yandina from March 2002 until November 2015. These meetings ceased due to a fall off in attendances not warranting members going to Yandina to conduct meetings.

Event and meeting times have been changed constantly over the years as technology and membership needs have changed. It is because the Club has been allowed to change, that the Club has grown and prospered. These changes were brought about to make the Club more efficient, save the Club money and to better cater for the majority of member's needs.

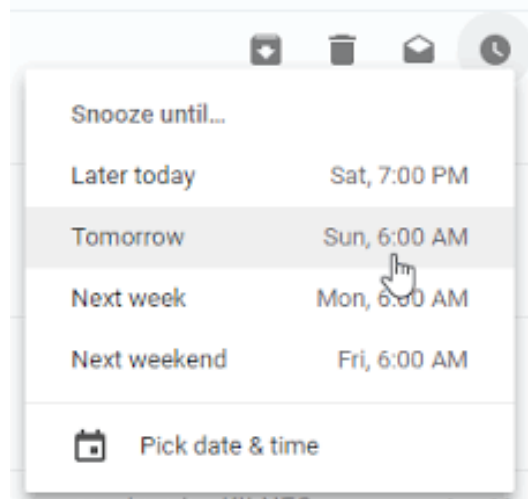
Don't Have time to read an email now?

Anzac Biscuit Recipe

A favourite CWA recipe for Anzac biscuits

Ingredients:

1 cup rolled oats
 1 cup plain flour
 1 cup raw or brown sugar
 (or maybe a little less)
 3/4 (three-quarters) cup
 coconut
 125g (4 oz) butter
 2 tablespoons golden syrup
 1/2 (half) teaspoon
 bicarbonate of soda
 1 tablespoon boiling water



Method:

Combine oats, sifted flour, sugar and coconut.

Combine butter and golden syrup, stir over gentle heat until melted.

Mix soda with boiling water, add to melted butter mixture, stir into dry ingredients.

Take teaspoonfuls of mixture and place on lightly greased oven trays; allow room for spreading.

Cook in slow oven (150°C or 300°F) for 20 minutes.

Loosen while still warm, then cool on trays.

Makes about 35. Note - for crunchier biscuits, use more golden syrup

Glossary of Common Texting Abbreviations and Web Jargon

Glossary of Common Texting Abbreviations and Web Jargon



Today, it's all about the handheld internet. Our messages need to be short and thumb-friendly for typing but we still need to pack in meaningful information along with the baseline ingredients of courtesy and etiquette.

Hundreds of bizarre jargon expressions have spawned as a result. Primarily about shorthand, the new jargon saves us keystrokes to say THNX (thank you) or TY (you're welcome). The new jargon also conveys spontaneous emotion and personal expressions.

How much of the new jargon do you know?

Below you'll find a list of the most common modern text message and chat expressions. All of these expressions may be typed lowercase or uppercase as a matter of personal style.

HMU - Hit Me Up

This acronym is used to say "contact me" or otherwise "reach me to follow up on this". It is a modern shorthand way to invite a person to communicate with you further.

FTW - For the Win

FTW is an internet expression of enthusiasm. While there were nastier meanings in previous years, FTW today commonly stands for "For the Win". It is an expression of enthusiasm. "FTW" is the same as saying "this is the best" or "this item will make a big difference."

OMG - Oh My God!

Also: AMG - Ah, My God!

OMG, just like 'O Gawd', is a very common expression for shock or surprise.

WBU - What About You?

This expression is used in personal conversations where the two parties are well acquainted. This expression is commonly used to ask for the other person's opinion, or to check for their comfort level with the situation.

IDC - I Don't Care

You would use IDC when you are trying to make a decision with your messaging friend, and you are open to multiple options. While IDC is largely an emotion-less term, it can sometimes convey a negative attitude, so it is best to use this expression with friends and not new acquaintances.



W/E - Whatever

W/E is a dismissive and passive-aggressive expression, often used as a rude way to diminish someone's comment. It is a way of saying 'I'm not interested in arguing this point any more', or 'I disagree, but I don't care enough to make an issue of it.' Like most things passive-aggressive, this expression is a form of sugar-coated hostility.

TTT - To the Top

Also known as 'Bump'

This abbreviation is used to push an ageing conversation thread to the top of the recent list. You would do this to promote a conversation before it gets forgotten.

WB - Welcome Back

This pleasant expression is common in online communities (e.g. MMO gaming), or in regular IM conversations at people's work desks. When a person types "back" to announce their return to the computer/phone, the other party types 'WB' to greet the person.

SMH - Shaking My Head

SMH is used to show disbelief at someone's stupidity or bad decision. It's a way to pass judgment on other people's actions.

BISLY - But I Still Love You

This slang acronym is used as playful affection, often during online arguments or debates. It can be used to mean "no hard feelings", or "I don't like what you just said, but I won't hold it against you. BISLY is commonly used between people who are familiar with each other.

TYVM - Thank You Very Much

Also: TY - Thank You

This is a form of common courtesy, shortened to four letters.

GTG - We're Good to Go

Also: GTG - I've Got to Go

GTG is a way of saying "I'm ready" or "we're ready". It is common when messaging to organize a group event, and everything is in order.

Payment demanded by gift card? It's a scam

Scamwatch 27 March 2019

Gift cards are increasingly the payment method of choice for scammers. Scamwatch reports show more than \$5 million was lost in 2018, a 38 per cent increase compared with 2017.

iTunes cards accounted for \$3.1 million in losses — a 156 per cent increase from the \$1.23 million reported in 2017.

Losses to scams where non-iTunes gift cards were used as payment increased by 530 per cent in 2018 to around \$1 million.

There are several common types of scams involving gift cards:

ATO impersonation scams

- The scammer pretends to be from the Australian Taxation Office and claims there is a warrant for their victim's arrest. The scammer asks the victim to pay an immediate 'fine' using gift cards or bitcoin, and claims police will come and arrest them if not.

Catch-a-hacker scam

- The scammer calls and pretends to be from a law-enforcement agency or internet provider and convinces the victim they are trying to trace the location of a hacker who has compromised the victim's computer. They claim they can do this by sending money from the victim's bank account or via gift card serial numbers.

Victims are also tricked into giving up personal details with the promise of gift cards. Scammers entice victims to participate in surveys by promising gift cards as a prize, however the surveys extract personal information such as your name, date of birth, address details and even financial details like your credit card or bank numbers.

If you are asked to pay using a gift card, it is most likely a scam

If you paid a scammer with a gift card, report it as soon as possible. Call the company that issued the gift card and tell them the gift card was used in a scam. It's very difficult to get your money back but the sooner you report it, the better your chances.

World Backup Day

Staysmart Online 25 March 2019

This World Backup Day (Sunday 31 March 2019) is a time to consider what you would do if you lost all your photos, contacts and documents without warning.

Our digital photos and videos of our friends, children and family or holidays would be irreplaceable if lost. And do you have time to replace your contacts lists and documents?

It is important that precious memories and files are protected if your computer or device crashes, goes missing or is attacked by a malware infection or other internet nasty. These types of incidents are way more common than you may realise, and can happen without warning.

So what is a backup?

A backup is a second copy of all your important files such as your family photos, videos from holidays, personal documents and emails.

Instead of just storing it all in one place (like your computer), you keep another copy elsewhere, just in case something happens to the original.

How do I backup my photos, documents and other important files?

1. Back up to an external hard-drive, the cloud or both!

People generally back their data up one of two ways — either to an external hard drive or to the internet (commonly known as the cloud). You can backup to both for extra peace of mind.

Operating systems, like Windows and Mac, have simple step-by-step instructions on the support pages of their websites:

2. Back-up regularly

Whether you backup daily, weekly, fortnightly or monthly is up to you and your individual circumstances, but the rule of thumb is the more frequently the better.

3. Turn on automatic back-ups

Most providers offer the option in your device's settings for you to schedule automatic backups, but it's important that you turn this feature on.
