Coronavirus COVID-19 & Flu Season, first line of defense! - Peter Daley

In a recent photo of people being evacuated from the guarantined cruise ship in Japan back to the US by plane, it showed people wearing their protective face masks on upside down, and others with no air seal around the nose and mask!

It is very important to have the knowledge on how to use Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) properly, and exercise very good hygiene practices in environments like this. If you do, it will greatly improve your chances of avoiding infection during a pandemic or flu event.

If you are in a country where the numbers of infected people dramatically increase all of a sudden, you could find your everyday life turned upside down. Within a very short period of time large parts of your country, towns or districts, could be placed under quarantine.

This may not happen in your location. Lets hope it doesn't. If it does, having the proper knowledge, skills and equipment on hand will greatly improve your family's chances of of avoiding infection. Do research, bookmark, printout, and download instructional information that will provide your family with the necessary knowledge and skills.

Phone Soap Tested on Discovery Channel

With just about everyone addicted to their mobile phone, it would be a very good idea to learn how to sanitize it properly. These devices can be a significant vector in the spread of a contagion. Why Some USB Cables Refuse To Charge Your Phone

A cable is a cable is a cable, right? Not quite. While there *shouldn't* be any difference from one USB cable over another—it's mostly the protective covering around the cable and a bunch of marketing. Pick the wrong cable, and you might find yourself with a paperweight instead of a fully charged device when you wake up to start your day.

Advice: When you're charging your devices, take a second to confirm they are actually charging. And when you can, check in on them. If they seem to be charging incredibly slowly, consider swapping to a different USB cable or adaptor to see if that's any better.

This is the most basic form of troubleshooting you can do, but it's something that most people don't think much about. We tend to be quick to assume there's an issue with the device being charged, rather than that which you're using to charge it. Try different combinations of cables and adapters, and that might be all the troubleshooting you need when you're staring at something that simply won't turn on.

Rules for Email Etiquette

Watch what you say, and how you say it

Whereas the computer brings people together, its impersonal nature can lead to remarks that people would not think of saying in person. Do whatever it takes to stay courteous, even if that means taping a note to your computer reminding you to be decent and polite.

Human contact still matters

Do not communicate electronically at the expense of personal interaction. There is a reason people often need to discuss things face-to-face, and there are times when no substitute will do – whether you are breaking up with your boyfriend or asking your boss for a raise.

Reply to your emails

Most people at some point have felt swamped by the large number of emails they have to sift through. But replying to an email is good etiquette, especially if the sender is expecting a response. Acknowledging you received the email but will get back to the sender at a later time is a professional alternative to ignoring or avoiding certain emails.

You do not always have to "reply all"

Think about who needs to read your response. No one wants to read an email chain from twenty people that has nothing to do with them.

Keyboard Shortcuts

Using keyboard shortcuts can greatly increase your productivity, reduce repetitive strain, and help keep you focused.

For example, to copy text, you can highlight text (hold down the Shift key and pass the mouse cursor with the left side key held down over the text to copy the text required) then press the **Ctrl+C** shortcut which will copy the highlighted text to the Clipboard or Snipping Tool if that is operative on your computer.

The keyboard shortcut is faster than highlighting with the mouse as above, and then moving the mouse to Edit on the Menu Bar and from the drop down list choosing to click Copy from the list, and then returning to the keyboard.

The portion copied will be on the Clipboard or Snipping Tool if that is operative on your computer.. Next step is to paste the copied text or graphic to a new place be it a document or e mail etc. This can be done quickly by using the keys **Ctrl+V** instead of Edit and from the drop down choosing Paste or Paste Special which gives alternatives of how the pasted copy will appear when pasted.

Keyboard short cuts cover un numberable combination of 3337 key strokes that can be used. There are some shortcut keys specific to operating systems – Windows, Linux, Apple, and then within each of these specific to portions of those eg Windows Excel, Word etc Programs such as Firefox, Chrome, Open Office have keyboard shortcuts specific to that program as well as the general Shortcut keys being able to be used everywhere.

It is also possible to create shortcuts specific to a task to be done if there is no available shortcut that is right for your specific task,

Due to the un numberable combination of key strokes it is better to learn a few of the common ones that could speed up what you are doing.

Commonly used shortcuts include:

Shortcut Keys	Description
Ctrl+C	Copy selection
Ctrl+V	Paste selection
Ctrl+Z	Undo last action.
Ctrl+B	Change selected text to be bold.
Ctrl+I	Change selected text to be in italics.
Ctrl+U	Change selected text to be underlined.
Ctrl+X	Cut selected item.
Ctrl+A	Select all text.

He was particularly aware of the allure of Facebook "likes", which he describes as "bright dings of pseudopleasure" that can be as hollow as they are seductive. And Rosenstein should know: he was the Facebook engineer who created the "like" button in the first place.

There is growing concern that as well as addicting users, technology is contributing toward so-called "continuous partial attention", severely limiting people's ability to focus, and possibly lowering IQ. One recent study showed that the mere presence of smartphones damages cognitive capacity – even when the device is turned off. "Everyone is distracted," Rosenstein says. "All of the time."

"The technologies we use have turned into compulsions, if not full-fledged addictions," Eyal writes. "It's the impulse to check a message notification. It's the pull to visit YouTube, Facebook, or Twitter for just a few minutes, only to find yourself still tapping and scrolling an hour later." None of this is an accident, he writes. It is all "just as their designers intended"

Netflix Users Beware

Netflix subscribers are being warned to show caution after a sophisticated phishing scam was discovered.

The scam ironically mimics 3-step verification - a common digital safety feature used to protect sensitive data online – to trick victims into thinking the email is from Netflix.

Victims receive an email purporting to be from the Netflix, which advises them their "billing information has been modified" and must be updated in the next 24 hours, otherwise their account will be suspended.

A hyperlink to Netflix's "online help centre" is included in the body of the email, with unsuspecting victims taken to a fake login page after clicking the link.

Despite extensive efforts to disguise the scam as an official correspondence from Netflix, several red flags to indicate the email isn't authentic. These include several grammar and spelling errors in the email and the lack of Netflix domain missing from the email address which sent the initial email.

The purpose behind the scam is to steal Netflix users' sensitive data, including credit card information.

Huawei can't do Google – just in case you were not perfectly clear

Huawei can't do Google for any phones released after 16 May 2019. The exceptions are very few cases where an existing phone is re-released in substantially the same form in other regions.

Why can't Huawei do Google after 16 May 2019? This is the date that the US government placed Huawei on its Entity List. This government action prohibits all US companies, including Google, from collaborating or trading with Huawei.

Huawei is developing its own operating system called

Harmony OS, but that is years from being stable enough for smartphones. In the interim, it is using AOSP (Android Open Source Project) of Android 9, and it is



Huawei's responsibility to issue any security patches or updates that it, not Google develops.

Users also can access Huawei Mobile Service that includes the Huawei App Gallery, Huawei Browser and Huawei Assistant. But the lack of local apps like banking, loyalty cards, insurance etc. has cruelled sales in Australia.

One thing you will want to do is search the hundreds of free and paid watch faces to get one that suits you. These are essentially classic, minimalist, trendy, informative, health, time focused and more. Try the free ones first – my favourite is MD111 (see image above) that has Step, Floors, Heart Rate, Calories, Moon phase, date and digital time.



All the main apps are Samsung apps – mail, calendar, contacts, alarm, Gallery etc.

Of course, it supports Facebook, WhatsApp, Twitter, YouTube and more.
