June 2020 Monthly General Meeting of the Sunshine Coast Computer Club Inc. was cancelled.

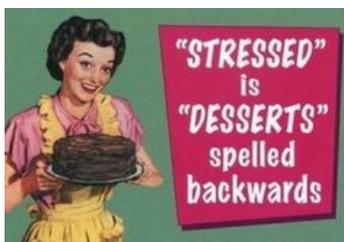
Due to the worldwide coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic, all SCCC activities have been cancelled until further notice.

COVID-19 update: Limited opening of Libraries

With the further easing of COVID-19 restrictions, Libraries are open Monday to Friday 9am-5pm. Customers can pick up reservations, browse and borrow items. Twenty customers are permitted in the library at any one time and the service is limited to ensure the safety of our community and staff. Numbers will be strictly monitored and customers will be required to act on the advice of library staff, observe social distancing and practice good hygiene.

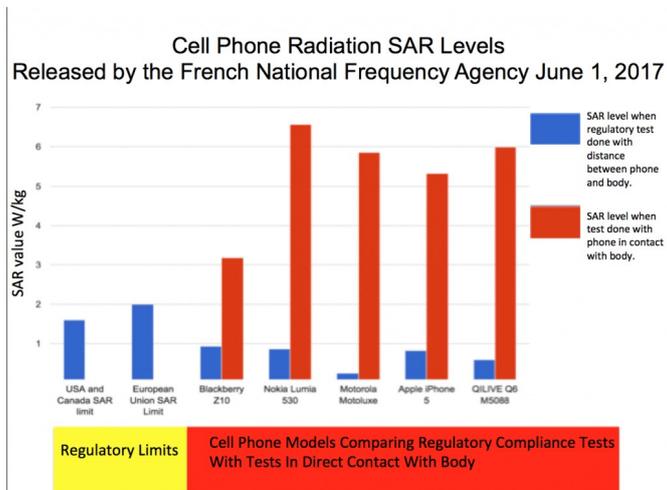
PhoneGate Alert Update 2020! - By Peter Daley

Large numbers of mobile phones in use are emitting microwave frequency radiation way above the regulatory limit <https://www.phonegatealert.org/en>, when placed against the body. For safety reason it would be wise to check if you are, or a family member is using one of these mobile phone models.

After months of legal action by French physician Dr. Marc Arazi, in June 2017 the National Frequency Agency of France (ANFR) revealed the 2015 test results of hundreds of cell phones. This ANFR study shows that if you use these phones like the majority of people do, touching the body, the phones greatly exceeded the French government radiation exposure safety limits.

If you do place one of these mobile phones directly in contact with your body, your exposure level to microwave radiation can be three or more times greater than the maximum Specific Absorption Rate (SAR) government safety level! Independent scientific experts around the world have been saying for decades that the microwave radiation SARs regulatory limits are already set far too high to protect public health, and particularly for children!



Phonegate organization has had some success in having a number of the offending mobile phones sanctioned, or withdrawn from the market, but there is a lot more to this story!

25th May 2020 - Withdrawal of the Razer Phone 2: not seeing the forest for the tree

Extracts:

Since then, in two years, thanks to our action, 23 different smartphone models controlled by ANFR have been found to have SAR levels for the head and body above the regulatory limit of 2 W/kg during ANFR inspections. Four have been withdrawn from the French market.

The others have only had their SAR level "updated" (reduced by updating).

However, tests conducted by both ANFR and the journalist Sam Roe for the Chicago Tribune have shown that the local body SAR level is multiplied by a factor of 3 to 4 when measured either at direct skin contact or at 2mm. That of the Razer Phone 2 could reach over 10 W/kg at direct contact with the skin.

"that the representative of the European Commission is hiding behind a staggering technocratic cynicism. His non-reaction shows the extent to which the mobile telephony industry lobbies have knowingly silenced the European authorities. We demand that this new health scandal, Phonegate, be treated with seriousness and a sense of responsibility. The health of hundreds of millions of Europeans citizen is at stake".

UPDATE to PhoneGate Alert!

Two new smartphones have just been sanctioned for exceeding the SAR level: the Xiaomi Redmi 7 and the Gigaset plus. This is a new advance in our alert action!

However, we have been waiting since last October for the Government to deliver on its promise to update the excessive SAR levels of several hundred mobile phone models. We demand that the commitments made following the recommendations of the French National Health Agency (ANSES) be fulfilled.

The Covid19 crisis does not justify such a delay. The Phonegate scandal is also a real health emergency!

Things that were 'real' a while back are now becoming 'virtual'

A few months ago very few would have heard of a Coronavirus but this is now more likely to be spoken or written as the shortened version of COVID-19.

Over the weeks the following are some of the words and phrases that have come into use - Virtual Meetings, Audio Conferencing, Video Conferencing, Webinars, Live Streaming, Virtual Tours, Virtual Queue, Virtual Concerts etc., and in each of these there are more previously less known words such as - Zoom, Webex, Google Meet, Skype, Microsoft Teams, ClickMeeting etc.

The meetings of participants, employees or families and friends, face-to-face has been curtailed by the restrictions that have been in place. These new types of meetings provide the same outcome as one-on-one and group real meetings with a few exceptions.

There are a lot of similarities and differences with each of these such as listening and interacting with a live person or persons with features such as chat, whiteboard, desktop sharing and learning, recording etc.

Some program plans allow free access to users for up to a certain number of participants by default in every meeting and others the cost is based on the number of users. An unlimited number of meetings can generally be held but to have more than one meeting concurrently, additional host licenses may be needed..

The need for participants or employees to meet face-to-face has been met by different virtual meeting types. These new types of meetings provide the same outcome as one-on-one and group meetings. They are much more comfortable given that participants can be set in virtual platforms using appropriate browsers and a fast internet connection at the convenient place by the user.

Virtual Meetings are real-time interactions that take place over the Internet using integrated audio and video, chat tools, and application sharing. People around the world, regardless of their location, link up online. Virtual meetings allow people to share information and data in real-time without being physically located together. They offer a way to engage students in fully interactive, online learning experiences such as lectures, discussions, and tutoring. Many virtual meeting applications integrate with course management systems, providing students and faculty with a unified learning system including access to online meetings

Audio Conferencing is a conference in which participants are only able to hear each other's voice. Audio conferencing is the conduct of an audio conference (also called a conference call or audio teleconference)

between two or more people in different locations using a series of devices that allow sounds to be sent and received, for the purpose of communication and collaboration simultaneously.

An audio conference may involve only two parties, or many parties involved at the same time. Audio conferencing can be conducted either through telephone line or the Internet by using devices such as phones or computers. If one only wants to listen, he/she just needs speakers. If he/she decides to speak as well, he/she may need a microphone as well.

Video Conferencing has both audio and video from multiple sites. This allows the participants to see each other while communicating. A video conference is a live, visual connection between two or more people residing in separate locations for the purpose of communication. For businesses Video conferencing boosts productivity, saves time, reduces travel expenses, and overall promotes collaboration. The advantage of video conferencing is the ability to facilitate all of those benefits without requiring constant travel for face-to-face communication.

A Webinar is an engaging online event where a speaker, or small group of speakers, deliver a presentation, lecture, workshop or seminar that is transmitted over the Web to a large audience who participate by submitting questions, responding to polls and using other available interactive tools.

You would not be able to see or hear the audience while you are presenting a webinar. The audience does have the ability to type in and submit questions to the speaker during the live session.

Generally the person hosting webinar using tools like webex, gomeetnow etc. can be seen so that people can feel that they are listening and interacting with a live person.

A Webinar is more of an audio conference with the additional ability to view slides (or video) on your browser. There is one "stream" multi cast to many. Can involve a few to a thousand attendees.

Live Streaming refers to online streaming media simultaneously recorded and broadcast in real time. It is often referred to simply as streaming, but this abbreviated term is ambiguous because "streaming" may refer to any media delivered and played back simultaneously without requiring a completely downloaded file. (Used recently in occasions such as funerals and weddings when the attendance was restricted.)

Virtual tours are a simulation of an existing location, usually composed by a sequence of videos or still images. It may also use other multimedia elements such as sound effects, music, narration, and text. Virtual tours have been used by real estate firms to allow properties to be seen to advantage by their buyers who cannot visit the property.

Virtual tours are available on the internet to travel the world from home to museums, art galleries and tourist locations.

Virtual Queue has been used to describe a queue of callers waiting for a telephone or internet call to be answered (while listening to music that may not be of your taste or being told over and over "your call is important to us")

Virtual Concerts - As more festivals, performances and concerts are cancelled due to the coronavirus shut-down, musicians of all stripes and sizes are streaming platforms to play live for their fans on streaming platforms such as Facebook, Instagram and YouTube. Some will require registration or a subscription, but most will be free, often with digital tip jars and opportunities to directly support artists by buying music and merchandise.

In accordance with the Club Privacy Policy the Club guards the Members Data Base details as best as possible and does not publish members addresses or telephone numbers unless authorised.

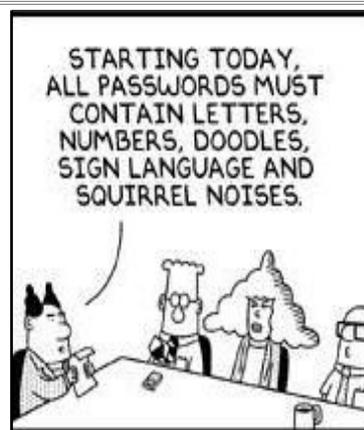
During this time when the Club is not conducting general meetings a member may wish to contact another member but not know their email address. To assist these members, especially those in isolation the

STAY SMART ONLINE

Alerts

In these uncertain times, and using peoples' fear and need for safety against them, the scammers are still working hard.

Hopefully you have managed to recognize, dodge or avoid all the 3815 scams and hoaxes that have become prevalent since the advent of Covid 19.

As with most scams, your own common sense is your best defence in protecting yourself. **If it sounds too good to be true, then it probably is** and you need to delete the email or text or simply hang up if it is a phone call.

Do not engage in discussion with the caller... they are trained for that. You will give them information they can use without even realizing you are doing so. Please be careful!

With the rise in Online Shopping, Australia Post has issued this warning...

Australia Post is aware of fraudulent emails being sent using their branding and prompting customers to click on a link. The emails falsely claim a package hasn't been delivered, due to its weight exceeding the limit – and it includes a link to click on to 'Pay Fee' or seek 'Further information.' These links lead to a fake Australia Post website requesting personal and financial information.

DO NOT ever give your private details online as it is an ideal opportunity for **Identity Theft**.

"Fake Emails" from 'Judy Smith'

If you have received unexpected emails from 'Judy Smith' recently, particularly in the middle of the night please do not open them.

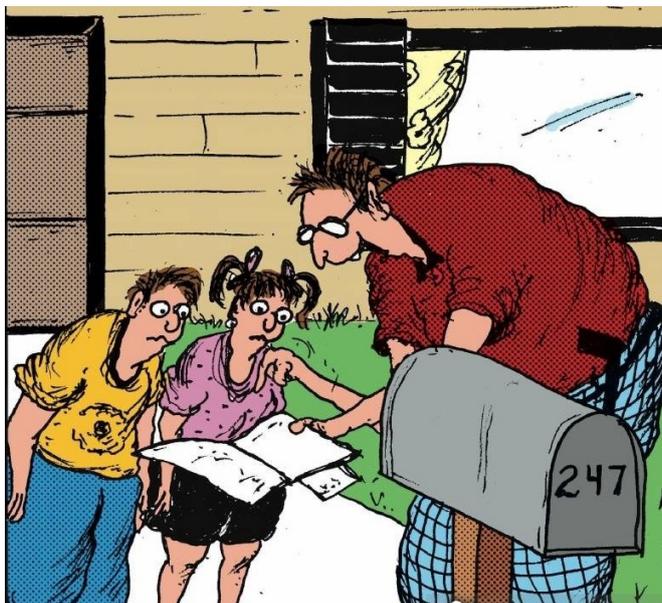
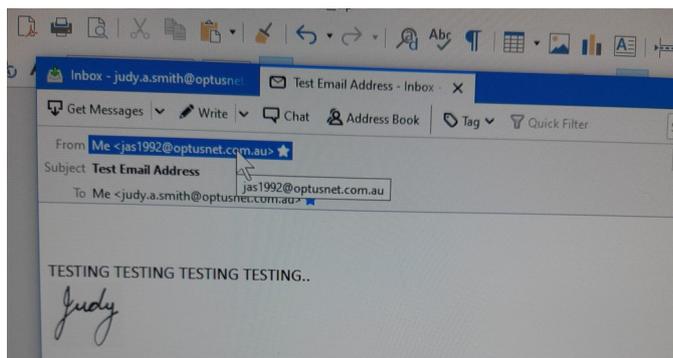
They are not from this Judy Smith. These emails usually refer to an article that has been 'forwarded' from Judy Smith to your email.

Disregard these emails.

If in doubt about an email you have received from anyone, check the sender of the email.

First, hover over the *From* display name to see what email address pops up (move your cursor over the information that you want to verify).

It's very common for an attacker to spoof a display name to look like it is coming from someone legitimate, but when you hover over the display name you'll often find that message is actually coming from someone else.



More Bits'N'Pieces

Find out all the information Google knows about you.

Google will show you all the information they've collected on you and even what ads they are serving you with.

Here's a list of the information Google provides you with:

- **History** - Your entire Google search history.

- **Ads** - What Google thinks your interests are and the ads they are serving you based on those interests.

- **Location History** - The places where you used Google to do anything.

Banana Bread Recipe

INGREDIENTS:

- 1 cup plain flour ½ cup self-raising flour
- ½ cup brown sugar
- 1 tsp cinnamon 125g butter, melted, cooled
- 2 eggs, whisked
- 3 ripe bananas, mashed



METHOD:

1. Preheat oven to 180 degrees. Grease and line the base of a 11 x 21 cm loaf tin.
2. Combine flours, sugar and cinnamon in a large bowl. Whisk butter and eggs together, stir in bananas. Spoon into prepared pan. Smooth the surface.
3. Bake for 45 – 50 minutes or until a skewer inserted in the centre comes out clean. Set aside in the pan for 10 minutes before turning out onto a wire rack to cool.

Serve warm or cold, with or without butter
