●A zero-day flaw in **Adobe Acrobat Reader** has been exploited since December 2025.

Opening a single PDF is all it takes for hackers to get in your device.

No clicks, no downloads.

Adobe released an emergency patch. **Update** before you open another file.

Click Help in the top menu, Select Check for Updates.

Hackers figured out how to hide malicious code inside a completely normal-looking PDF.

It looks real. It opens normally. But the moment you open it, the hidden code runs.

No extra clicks. No downloading anything. No warning. Open the file, and you're done.

Moving photos from your **iPhone** to **Google Drive** requires you to [get the Google Drive app](#) and have a Google account set up.

From there, it's a relatively simple process. Here's what to do:

Make sure to connect to Wi-Fi before uploading multiple files, as it can be slower and more time-consuming when using mobile data.

Open the Google Drive app on your phone and tap the multicolored + symbol.

Tap Upload file.

Tap Photos and Videos.

Tap **Allow Full Access**.

Browse your iPhone albums to find the photos you wish to upload to Google Drive.

To upload multiple photos at once, tap each one.

Select UPLOAD. The photos will now be uploaded to your Google Drive account.

To automatically have all your iPhone photos move to your Google account, you need to use the [Google Photos app for iOS](#).

Here's how to set it up.

Generally, when using it for the first time, Google Photos automatically backs up all your photos,

but if it does not, follow these steps.

Open Google Photos and tap your profile image in the corner.

Tap **Google Photos settings**.

Tap **Backup**.

Tap the toggle next to **Backup** to switch it on.

Your photos and videos will now be uploaded to your Google account and accessible through the Google Photos app or website.

This could take some time, depending on how many pictures you have on your iPhone.

To back up your **photos, contacts, and calendars**, install the **Google One app** and then open it to Menu > Settings > Sync settings.

Choose an option, such as Contacts, and then follow the on-screen steps. The next time you back up your device, it will save only new information, like new photos, and overwrite any existing information, like old contacts and calendars.

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When it comes to replacing Microsoft Office on any device, there are plenty of fantastic open-source alternatives that can do the same job for no cost.

But if I had to recommend one to anyone, I would tend to recommend .

It's very polished and feels very similar to Microsoft Office, especially if you turn on the Ribbon-styled UI.

But the recent **LibreOffice** 26.2 update added something I didn't realize I needed until I started using it: Markdown support.

If you've ever used Markdown in the past, you'll know exactly why this is such a great feature.

If you've ever sent a customized message in Discord, you've already used Markdown,

and now you can implement those same stylistic choices in your favorite word processor. Best part? It is free.

If it's unexpected or urgent, slow down... no quick-pay links, open your bank or service app directly instead.

2. Ring a caller back on a verified number

If money or data is involved, do not provide this on an incoming call.

Ring the company on the number on their website or your card, not the one in the message.

3. Assume anyone can be fooled

Treat every email as suspicious.

Use strong logins like passkeys, and keep less personal info public (private Facebook profiles) so scammers have less to mimic.
