Monthly General Meetings of the Sunshine Coast Computer Club Inc. have been cancelled until further notice.


Due to the worldwide coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic, your committee cancelled all SCCC activities until further notice.

Club Video Meeting & Etiquette - President Peter Daley

How many people can effectively join the average home internet connection, for a video chat session or small business meeting?

The number of people you can have in a video chat is determined by the bandwidth of your Internet connection. This also depends on when you have the video chat, because Internet bandwidth can change dramatically during the day. During peak periods the available bandwidth can significantly decrease. Picking a low bandwidth time can make a big difference to the effectiveness of your meeting. This will help avoid annoying video and sound freezes and drop outs from occurring during your video chat. Having an Ethernet wired connection between your computer and your internet modem will be generally faster than using a Wifi connection.

Using an internet service with a bandwidth of 12 Mbps download and 1Mbps upload speed as an example. If you have 7 people in a video chat you are looking at around 8 Mbps download & 512 kbps upload, or around 8 GB per hour. If your monthly Internet connection plan has a small download limit, then video conferencing could easily push you over the limit in a very short period of time. These cheaper residential NBN plans would probably be able to cope with around 8 to 12 people before they became overloaded.

If you just use voice and switch the video off, or use a poorer video quality to lower the data download, you could have more people in the chat. With very large bandwidth enabled business to business connections, you may be able to potentially have up to 60 to 80 people in a video chat, using Zoom, Face Time, or Skype. These up market Internet connections tend to be expensive.

With attendances of 10 to 80 people in a video chat you really need everyone well trained up on video conferencing etiquette, or it will turn into a disorganized mess.

To streamline and improve the effectiveness of your video chats, everyone attending should get familiar with "These Are the Biggest Dos and Dont's of Video Conferencing."

Some Hints and Shortcuts for Apache OpenOffice - Jean Lear

Some Hints and Shortcuts for Apache OpenOffice

Since starting to do the Admin for the Sunshine Coast Computer Club Inc (too many years ago to remember) I have used Apache OpenOffice.

I have used Apache OpenOffice in preference to Libre OpenOffice as in making the choice I found one or two small points of difference. Apache was more suited to me. The parts of Apache Open Office used by me are the Writer, Spreadsheet and Drawing. I will list some short cuts and hints I have found and used in using OpenOffice.

Before starting work there are some important settings to be made in Tools – Options and set up for each part of OpenOffice that is intended to be used. I think the most important in the Options Window is to open Load/ Save and in Save - tick boxes and ensure that the radio button is set to save every ten or fifteen minutes. This is different to the Save and Save As in the Drop down under file or the Save icon on the tool bar. This does an automatic save at the timings set so that if the computer crashes before or between the actual Save or Save As is set, which saves the work to a file, this will mean anything written after the save (to file) is automatically saved and if the computer crashes File Recovery can recover back to the last automatic save.

Some minor changes made to tool bars were -

Writer – View – Toolbars – Checked are – Drawing, Find, Formatting and Standard which

with Apache OpenOffice will add further icons to the tool bars to suit the user. (Using an icon from the tool bar is more time efficient than going to the headings at the top of the page and choosing from the drop down menu. An example for this is to have icons on the tool bar for upper case and lower case. The drop down from the > Format > Change Case > gives more options. If a simple change from upper to lower case or vice versa is needed all that is required to do this is to highlight the text 2239 and click on an icon on the tool bar.)

Extra icons I have added to Tool bars for frequently used options -

In Writer -

- Lower Case and Upper Case
- Paste an icon which gives options to paste in different formats (OpenOffice Writer, DDE link, HTML (Hyper Text Markup Language), Formatted text (RTF), Unformatted text (Depending on the format of the text being pasted in)

In Calc (Spreadsheet) -

- Upper Case and Lower Case
- · Fill Down and Fill Series
- Align Top, Centre Vertically, Bottom
- Insert Rows, Insert Columns, Delete Rows, Delete Columns

Other aids for working are -

- Snip and Sketch (always set delay to four or five seconds with gives more time to settle on size of snip etc)
- MS Free Clipboard (allows up to twenty snips to be saved before pasting and another part that saves permanent snips)
- Snip and Sketch (formerly the Snipping Tool)

Some frequently used shortcuts are -

• Ctrl + C Copy any highlighted text

Ctrl + V Paste any highlighted text

• Ctrl + Z To reverse your last action. You can reverse more than one action.

• Windows Key + D Switch to desktop view

Windows Key + E Open Window Explorer

When using Drawing program to make a card — If the card is going to be folded into four, set up two templates - one in Portrait and one in Landscape layout to divide card into where the exact folds will be on the card. This is useful when making a four fold card as it is necessary to lay out the content of the card in one part in reverse (upside down to the other part) so when folded the card will read correctly. Do not forget to delete the fold lines before printing the card!

A very useful icon on the tool bar indicates whether there is unsaved content in the current document. If there is content to be saved the icon (Shaped like a screen) will show as blue. As soon as a Save or Save As is done the icon will grey out. One keystroke will bring back colour signifying there is something to be saved.

If there is unsaved work in the document and the "X" (Close) in the top right hand corner of the document is clicked to close the document a Window comes up as a reminder that there is work to be saved.

Window 10 Shortcut Keys

The Windows key made its first appearance in 1994, and it's still an essential tool for Windows 10 power users. Here are the some Keyboard Shortcuts for Windows 10 that you should know about.

Starting with Windows 95, the Windows key could perform basic desktop tasks like opening the start menu, minimizing all open windows, cycling through taskbar buttons, and so on. Windows 2000 brought the much welcome keyboard shortcut for locking your desktop. Windows XP brought new Windows Key shortcuts, such as selecting the first item in the notification area and opening "Search for Computers." The story continued with Windows Vista, Windows 7, 8, and 8.1. Windows 10 offers many useful shortcuts added to Windows over the last several decades as well as some new ones.

There are numerous keyboard shortcuts involving the Windows key. Here are some you should know about.

Wattle Day



The first celebration of Wattle Day in more than one state on the same day took place, on 1st September in 1910 in NSW, Victoria and South Australia.

And then with the First World War (1914-1918) and the desire to sell wattle sprigs to raise money for the troops overseas and

later for maimed soldiers and women and children's charities, the date was changed to 1st August.

In 1992 as a unifying gesture for this particular celebration, the first day of spring - 1st September - was proclaimed by the Governor-General, Sir Ninian Stephen, to be Australia's National Wattle Day.

Wattles have long had special meanings for Australians and in 1988 the Golden Wattle (Acacia pycnantha) was officially gazetted as Australia's national floral emblem.



Skype for Web

Skype for Web offers video and audio calling, as well as instant messaging. Video and voice calls are free to anywhere in the world.

The simplest way to use Skype is via your web-browser (Windows' Edge or Google's Chrome). Type


web.skype.com into the address-bar. It gives you the features of Skype's desktop app, without having to install the app.

You will, however, need to have a Skype account. If you already have any of the Microsoft email accounts (@Hotmail / @Live / @Outlook), you will be able to use it with its password. If you only use an @Bigpond or @gmail account, you will need to create a Skype account. After signing in, to communicate with someone, click the black 'Start a conversation' button. A blue 'Search' strip appears. Type the email address of the person you wish to communicate with for the first time. Then click on the blue 'Say hi' button that appears. Before you can have audio or video calls together, the recipient will need to consent to you contacting them. This is to thwart scammers.

On Windows 10 computers, the Skype desktop app is pre-installed. You may prefer to use that instead of the browser. Skype works with Apple macOS 10.12 or higher.

For your smartphone or tablet, you will need to download and install the app from your app store: for Android devices or Apple devices. You will be able to use the Skype account you created (above).

Skype offers conference calls (like Zoom) and end-toend encryption. You can also send documents, photos or links.

Online Shopping Scams

Online shopping scams involve scammers pretending to be legitimate online sellers, either with a fake website or a fake ad on a genuine retailer site.

How this scam works

While many online sellers are legitimate, unfortunately scammers can use the anonymous nature of the internet to rip off unsuspecting shoppers.

Scammers use the latest technology to set up fake retailer websites that look like genuine online retail stores. They may use sophisticated designs and layouts, possibly stolen logos, and even a `.com.au' domain name and stolen Australian Business Number (ABN).

Many of these websites offer luxury items such as popular brands of clothing, jewellery and electronics at very low prices. Sometimes you will receive the item you paid for but they will be fake, other times you will receive nothing at all.

The biggest tip-off that a retail website is a scam is the method of payment. Scammers will often ask you to pay using a money order, pre-loaded money card, or wire transfer, but if you send your money this way, it's unlikely you will see it again or receive your purchased item.

A newer version of online shopping scams involves the use of social media platforms to set up fake online stores. They open the store for a short time, often selling fake branded clothing or jewellery. After making a number of sales, the stores disappear. They also use social media to advertise their fake website, so do not trust a site just because you have seen it advertised or shared on social media. The best way to detect a fake trader or social media online shopping scam is to search for reviews before purchasing.

Some Warning signs

- A product is advertised at an unbelievably low price.
- The other party insists on immediate payment.
- The social media based store is very new and selling products at very low prices.
- An online retailer does not provide adequate information or details.

Google Pixel 4a – a back to basics 4G phone with lots of features

The Google Pixel 4a is a half-yearly 'value' update following on from the now sold out Pixel 4 and 4XL.

It also portends the release of a Pixel 4a 5G version and the new Pixel 5 in the coming months.


Now when I say 'value' version, it is not a stripped-tothe-bone Pixel 4. It is specified to meet the \$599 price point and uses most of the Pixel design philosophy and know how. The result is yet another wonderful example of what pure Google Android can be.

So, don't think you are missing anything buying the Google Pixel 4a – you are not! This review is after four very pleasurable weeks of use.

Should you wait for Google Pixel 4a 5G or 5 5G?

Not if all you want is 4G. Given our Telcos abysmal

coverage and the cost penalty of 5G handsets the answer is no. Perhaps by 2023 when 5G costs no more than 4G!

WD My Passport SSD 2020 – a fast external SSD

The WD My Passport SSD 2020 sets new speed records for portable SSD. It has a couple of speed tricks under the bonnet but to get the most out of it; you need a PC with a USB-C 3.2 Gen 2 or Thunderbolt 3 port.

First trick – the WD My Passport SSD 2020 is a version of the WD Blue SN550 NVMe – a great midrange SSD. When connected to an M.2 PCIe port, it achieves speeds of 2365.6/1913.5Mbps (Seq. R/W). It does not have a fast DRAM Cache (like WD Black), so it uses some emulated SLC cache to maintain speeds at least commensurate with the USB-C 3.2 Gen 2 interface. Most external USB connected devices don't have a bucket of cache.

Second trick – The transfer protocol UASP (Universal Attached SCSI Protocol) is now called NVM Express – that denotes some SCSI-like intelligence. With the right PC, it offers up to 70% faster read and 30% faster write speeds over USB 3.

Tests

We tested on a Microsoft Surface Pro with its USB-C 3.2 Gen 2 (10Gbps=1250MBps) and an HP x360 Spectre 2019 Thunderbolt 3 – this drive flies!

- * Interface: USB 3.2 Gen 2 (Thunderbolt 3 compatible and USB backwards compatible at lower speeds)
