## Interesting Questions - Peter Daley



### Should I turn off my NBN during storms?

Please read this whole article as there is important information in it. If you don't do your own research on this subject you could end up with equipment malfunction!

Every year as we enter the storm season, the club reminds members to turn off their electronic equipment during storms.

#### Update 2020:

This year it has become far more complicated because of the widespread use of NBN modems. These modems vary in function depending on what type of NBN service you have. This also means depending on the type of NBN modem you have, it may, or not be a good idea to turn it off.

If you have a **Fibre To The Premises (FTTP)** NBN modem, you could have major problems getting it all working again after turning it off. The general view seems to be leave this type of equipment on all the time. If you have a **Fibre To The Curb (FTTC)** or **Fibre To The Node (FTTN)** NBN modem it maybe OK to turn it off during a storm. It may take 10 minutes or longer to connect back onto the Internet after you turn it back on.

There are so many makes and models of NBN modems and so many different connection types, it is impossible to give a generic answer. **The bottom line is to check with your service provider before turning your NBN modem off.**

If your service provider says it is OK to turn off your NBN modem during storms, remember to disconnect your NBN modem from the telephone line wall socket. Power surges and voltage spikes can come through the telephone line, and mains power during storm activity! That's why in the past, phone companies had warnings in their literature not to use the old wired phones during storms.

**IMPORTANT:** Remember, that if you are using a **Voice Over Internet Phone system (VOIP)**, and you disconnect the phone line connection from the NBN

modem to the wall socket, your phone system, plus the Internet will be down until you reconnect the NBN modem to the modem phone line and power.

Also be aware some smart devices can loose all there settings if the device is left off for any length of time.

**So, during the storm season it is suggested that,**

- 1. If you are going out for the day, or longer,**
- 2. If you hear a storm coming,**
- 3. When you go to bed at night,**

You should turn your devices off normally, then unplug them from the mains power.

If you struggle to plug in or unplug a power lead, with the mains power switch turned on, you can create your own mini electrical storm inside the power switch. **So to protect your electrical devices from this potential source of damage, make sure the power socket is turned off before unplugging, or re-plugging your electrical devices into the mains socket.** That is why the club provides switchable power sockets at its venues.

You should turn off and unplug any mains connected device like a computers, laptops, tablets, charging mobile phone, wireless router, or any other network connected devices during a storm. If you have a TV aerial connected to your computer, you should also disconnect it.

Wait until the thunder and lightning have gone before reconnecting the equipment.

#### Update 2018

Historic cosmic ray levels have been detected in the upper atmosphere and this is causing a dramatic increase in the number of lightning strikes, and the severity of storms. The sun is going into one of its historic re-occurring solar minimums. ### Video playing upside down? How to correct this by Peter Daley

*The videos are the right way up when viewed on my phone but when I down load them onto my lap top & view them they are upside down. Any suggestions how to fix this?"*

Download the free VLC video player and install it.

Once you have installed it open your video in this program, pause it, if it starts playing.

Go to the menu item "Tools" click it.

Then click in the item "Effects & Filters", in the drop down box that appears.

In the box that appears click the "Video Effects" Tab and then the "Geometry" Tab, after this tick the "Rotate" item in the window under this tab.

Now use the rotational dial next to it and rotate the video to 180 degs.

After you have oriented the video the way you want it, click "Save" and then click the "Close" button at the bottom of this box.

Now when you start playing the video it will have the correct orientation

If you don't press "Save", the next time you open the video, it will revert to the original orientation!

### **Windows has a full-screen magnifier built-in that can make it easier to see a portion of the screen?**

*To run it on Windows 10, hold down the Windows key and press the '+' key. Keep repeating this command until it is the size you need, then move your mouse to view different areas of the screen.*

## History of Sunshine coast Computer Club Magazine – Jean Lear

The first Sunshine Coast Computer Club Magazine was issued in February 1989 under the name of Sunshine Coast Computer Users Group Newsletter when the Club was less than six months old. It was a double sided A4 sheet and the Editor was Jason Trump. The magazine progressed through various name changes including 'Input/Output', SCCUG News and Views Monthly Newsletter. The December 2003 issue carried the title of Bits'N'Bytes which is still the magazine title.

Looking through the files of previous Newsletters reveals a series of editors of the magazine including the first editor - Jason Trump (February 1989/July 1989 and April 1990), Daz Picton (August 1989/March 90), Harry Boon (September 1990/March 1993), Paul McDonald (April– November 1993) Brad Angie (December 1993/February 1996) Acting Editor Kerry Pleml (April 1996) Acting Editor/Editor Roy Nipperess (June 1996/February 1999) Heather Atkinson (March 1999/April 2002) Pam Chadwick (May 2002/October 2003) Bram Gibson (November 2003/February 2005) Peter Daley (March 2005/ May 2008) Heather Atkinson (June 2008 to September 2010) and Judy Smith (October 2010 to present)

### Extract from the June 1998 issue of Bits'N'Bytes

#### "E-MAILED NEWSLETTER

To improve our service to Club members we are now offering members of the Club the Bits'N'Bytes magazine as an e-mail attachment, in a self extracting HTML page format. The advantage is that we can then produce the news letter in colour, with animation, multimedia, and with hyper links directly to the sources of files, programs and information. This would be too expensive to do in normal print. ....Heather Atkinson our BBS Syop \*, is doing the translation from the paper version to the Internet version. The thought and design work she has put into the e mail version has been excellent. It is colourful, easy to use and has some great features. If you have an e mail account try this out, its great. Those of you who would like to try this new service please let us know. At any time you can simply write to the Club e mail address and say that you would like the paper version instead." \* (Bulletin Board System - System Operating Procedures)

Until February 2002 there was no charge for members to receive a paper copy of the magazine posted to them, but as the costs of printing and posting had increased over the years the Annual General Meeting voted to levy a five dollar subscription for the paper version. At the Annual General Meeting of February 2004 the levy on receiving the paper copy of magazine was increased to twelve dollars per year rather than in-

crease the general membership fees. The cost remains the same today with the Club covering the increasing costs since then.

Over the years the magazine was created in MS Publisher program. When Peter Daley took over as Editor, the March 2005 edition was the first to be published using Open Office program with the feature of that program being to click the export to PDF button to instantly create the PDF version. This issue also changed to A4 format so members could print from the internet correlated and duplexes in either Adobe Reader or Open Office. (Foxit Reader has now been added as a PDF reading program) The July 2005 magazine was created by Peter in Linux with OpenOffice. When Heather Atkinson took over as Editor of the magazine (again) in June 2008 Heather did not use Linux in the creating of the magazine but continued using OpenOffice.

When Heather was going on an extended holiday Judy Smith volunteered to take over as Editor from the October 2010 issue and has been editor since then using OpenOffice.

It is hoped the long history and efforts of the Editors over the years will continue.

***(Judy Smith has recently moved to live in Brisbane and will continue as Editor until a new Editor comes forward or until the Annual General Meeting in February 2021.***

***Judy continued to use OpenOffice and can guide the new Editor in the take over.***

***The incoming Editor may continue to use OpenOffice or whatever program they prefer to use and will be given any assistance they need by Judy.)***

### What impact can identity theft have on a victim?

Your identity is valuable and you have a lot to lose—not only money but once lost it can take years to recover your identity. Falling victim to a scam and to identity theft can also cause emotional and psychological harm.

### How to protect yourself

Here are some simple steps you can take to protect yourself:

- Don't be pressured into giving away your information by someone who has contacted you.
- Never send money or give credit card details, online account details or copies of personal documents to anyone you don't know or trust.
- Limit what personal information you share about yourself online, including on social media.
- Check your credit report using a reputable credit reference bureau at least once every year for free, this can help you catch any unauthorised activity. Visit The Office of the Australian Information Commissioner for information. <https://www.oaic.gov.au/privacy/credit-reporting/access-your-credit-report/>
- Avoid clicking on links in emails or messages, even if it appears to have come from a legitimate source.
- To visit a website or log into an account, type the address into the browser yourself.
- Don't provide strangers remote access to your computer, you never really know who you're dealing with.
- Use strong passwords for your accounts and internet network, and never share them with others.
- Install anti-virus software on all of your devices and keep them up-to-date.
- Lock your mailbox.
- Shred any sensitive documents you no longer need

### Superannuation early-access scams

The Australian Government has made available to eligible individuals early access to their superannuation. Scammers are taking advantage of the government's measures in a variety of phishing scams designed to steal your superannuation.

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### Online shopping scams

Scammers have created fake online stores claiming to sell products that don't exist — such as cures or vaccinations for COVID-19, and products such as face masks.

### Tips to protect yourself from these types of scams:

- The best way to detect a fake trader or social media shopping scam is to search for reviews before purchasing. No vaccine or cure presently exists for the coronavirus.

- Be wary of sellers requesting unusual payment methods such as upfront payment via money order, wire transfer, international funds transfer, preloaded card or electronic currency, like Bitcoin.

The content will be a mix of speakers who can provide practical advice on how to adapt to online life and some representatives from the big tech companies talking about what is coming up.

No, you don't have to watch all day you can pick and choose the sessions that you are most interested in.

### Fitbit Versa 3 smart watch

Another year and now we're up to the Fitbit Versa 3. Has it changed? Well, quite a lot it, turns out.

**About:** Fitbit is a US company based in San Francisco, specialising in making fitness tracking bands and now smart watches and related health devices. See our reviews of other Fitbit products here.

### Fitbit Versa 3 versus Versa 2

There have been significant changes with the new model over the old one. Although the body is very close to the same size, the Fitbit Versa 3 smartwatch's corners are slightly more rounded. And that contributes to the one single backwards step in the 3 versus the 2. The single control button for the Fitbit Versa 3 now feels as though it is even further recessed into the side, kind of tucked a little under the face. That combined with the heavy springing made it hard to press.
