I know these have been difficult times for everyone, and I hope you are all safe and well.

The committee has been very busy in the background doing everything it can to keep the Club financially viable in this difficult environment, and operating conditions.

The committee would like to sincerely thank all those members who have renewed their membership, and kept faith in the Club. That support has greatly contributed to the Club still being in a sound financial state, even after such a lengthy shut down period.

The committee organized online services like Tech Questions, and video meetings in the interim. We understand that the video meetings are not the same as real life meetings, but were the best technical substitute that was available at the time. We all miss the social interaction and services provided at real life Club meetings.

Insurance Policy

The committee used the lock down period as an opportunity to negotiate a new more cost effective insurance policy. To hire venues Clubs are now required to have in place a public liability policy. Until the new insurance policy was set in place the Club could not open meetings anyway. This negotiation took a couple of months. A new Club insurance policy was finalized last week. This process has saved the Club a significant amount of money in yearly running costs.

Sale of no longer required Club equipment:

You will have noticed that in the recent Club Weekly bulletins, a number of pieces of Club equipment has been put up for sale. These items were considered to no longer be required, and rather than have these items collecting dust during the lock down, the committee organized the collection of these items from venues, so they could be put up for sale. You will notice more items for sale, being placed in the Club weekly bulletin's over the coming weeks. Keep an eye out for a bargain.

Re-opening of Club activities in 2021

The committee is aiming to reopen Club venues after Christmas, in January 2021. This is conditional on there being no significant resurgence in the local COVID-19 numbers, or another government lock down. Now that the New South Wales and Victorian COVID-19 waves have died down, it is hoped that members will feel more confident attending meetings.

Weekly Bulletins to be Sent to Members Who Have Not Renewed Membership Since March 2020

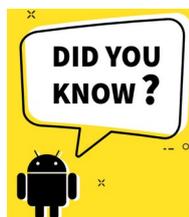

Some Interesting Facts About Android



Android is a Mobile Operating System which was released on 23, September 2008. Android is free, open-source operating system and is based on modified version of Linux kernel. Open Handset Alliance (OHA) developed the Android and Google commercially sponsored it. It is mainly designed for touchscreen devices such as smartphones and tablets. Android is supported on different platforms like 32- and 64-bit ARM, x86, and x86-64. Android is available in more than 100 languages with Graphical (multi-touch) as the default user interface.

- Initially, Android was developed as an operating system for digital cameras but later on it focuses on Smart Phones
- Android captures 88% of total smart phone market whereas IOS captures 11% market share.
- Even the Google Maps, uses the speed of Android Mobiles to calculate the traffic on roads.

Brief History of the Computer Mouse - Jean Lear

A computer mouse is a hand held hardware input device that controls a cursor in a GUI (graphical user interface) and can move and select text, icons, files, and folders on computers. The mouse was initially known as the X-Y Position Indicator for a Display System.

It was technology visionary and inventor Douglas Engelbart (Jan 25 – Jul 13) who revolutionized the way computers worked, turning it from a piece of specialized machinery that only a trained scientist could use to a user-friendly tool that almost anyone can work with. During his lifetime, he invented or contributed to several interactive and user-friendly devices such as the computer mouse, Windows operating system, computer video conferencing, hypermedia, groupware, email, the Internet and much more.

Making Computing Less Cumbersome

Most of all, though, he was known for inventing the computer mouse. Engelbart conceived of the rudimentary mouse while attending a conference on computer graphics, where he started thinking about how to improve interactive computing. In the early days of computing, users typed codes and commands to make things happen on monitors. Engelbart thought an easier way was to link the computer's cursor to a device with two wheels—one horizontal and one vertical. Moving the device on a horizontal surface would allow the user to position the cursor on the screen.

Engelbart's collaborator on the mouse project Bill English built a prototype - a hand-held device carved out of wood, with a button on the top. In 1967, Engelbart's company SRI filed for the patent on the mouse, although the paperwork identified it a little differently as "x,y position indicator for a display system." The patent was awarded in 1970.

Computer Mice Hits the Market

Before long, computers designed to work with a mouse were released. Among the first was the Xerox Alto, which went on sale in 1973. A team at the Swiss Federal Institute of Technology in Zurich liked the concept as well and built their own computer system with a mouse called the Lilith computer, sold from 1978 to 1980. Perhaps thinking they were on to something, Xerox soon followed up with the Xerox 8010, which featured a mouse, ethernet networking and e-mail among

various innovative technologies that have since become standard.

But it was not until 1983 that the mouse started to go mainstream. It was that year that Microsoft updated the MS-DOS program Microsoft Word to make it mouse-compatible and developed the first PC-compatible mouse. Computer manufacturers such as Apple, Atari and Commodore would all follow suit by debuting mouse compatible systems as well.

(Notes - Although a mouse can be set up for your left hand, some mice are molded for right-hand users and may feel uncomfortable with your left hand.

Because a laptop is designed for portability, almost all laptops today use a touch pad as the mouse, and some Lenovo laptops still use a TrackPoint. Also, all laptop computers can have a USB corded or wireless mouse attached to them.)

Tracking Ball and Other Advancements

Like other present forms of computer technology, the mouse has evolved significantly. In 1972, English developed the "track ball mouse" that allowed users to control the cursor by rotating a ball from a fixed position. One interesting enhancement is technology that enables wireless devices, a fact that makes Engelbart's recollection of an early prototype almost quaint.

When asked who named his most famous invention, Doug Engelbart recalled, "No one can remember. It just looked like a mouse with a tail, and we all called it that.

Some believe that mouse is short for "manually-operated user-select equipment." However, when Douglas Engelbart helped invent the mouse, he called it a mouse because the device resembled the rodent.

When talking about one (singular), refer to a computer mouse as a "mouse." When talking about two or more (plural), refer to them as "mice" (preferred), or "mouses."

To help prevent confusion, some companies and writers avoid using either plural form of a mouse by referring to multiple mice as "mouse devices."

Pass the word: Hackers are after us all

WE ARE being reminded to take extra precautions with passwords in the lead-up to Christmas as at least \$1.8 million was lost to hackers this year.

The government's Australian Digital Health Agency is calling for everyone to beefup their password security.

Even sharing your passwords with family and friends, or using the same passwords for multiple accounts, can put you in the eyes of scammers.

But the biggest password sin is choosing simple, easy to guess passwords. Having weak passwords is comparable to leaving your front door open or leaving your car unlocked. It's an invitation to unauthorised access and cyber compromise.

Verizon's cyber crime report said while 80 per cent of people say they are concerned about their password security, 81 per cent of password breaches involved weak and default passwords.

Scam victim support service IDCARE said the two most common attacks from scammers involve weak and repeated passwords. A common password like 123456 would take less than a second to crack.

The key to a strong password is keeping them unique, changing them every 30 days, and using 14 or more characters."

IDCARE is Australia and New Zealand's national identity and cyber support service. IDCARE have helped thousands of Australian and New Zealand individuals and organisations reduce the harm they experience from the compromise and misuse of their identity information by providing effective response and mitigation.

Watch out for online shopping scams this holiday season

Losses to online shopping scams have increased 42 per cent this year, and Scamwatch is warning Australians to be careful when buying gifts this holiday season.

Scamwatch has received over 12,000 reports of online shopping scams so far this year, with almost \$7 million in reported losses.

More people have been shopping online this year due to COVID-19 restrictions and scammers are now targeting people doing their Christmas shopping, including in the Black Friday and Cyber Monday sales.

Scammers create fake websites that look like genuine online stores, offering products at very low prices and victims will either receive a fake item or nothing at all.

They also post fake ads on classified websites, often claiming they are travelling and someone else will deliver the goods, but the item never arrives and the victim can no longer contact the seller.

Losses on classified websites, such as Facebook Marketplace and Gumtree, have increased by 60 per cent this year, to \$4.5 million.

Reports of online shopping scams involving consumer goods, such as shoes, phones, computers and toys, continue to be high. But the most common thing people were trying to buy when they were scammed was puppies and other pets.
